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A QUICK GUIDE FOR FIRST TIME EXHIBITORS

Q: *Who can enter exhibits?*

A: Anyone may enter exhibits in the fair. Check each department listing for details specific for that department. Some departments are limited due to space and staffing.

Q: *What does it cost to enter?*

A: Entry fees vary by department; see complete listing of entry fees on page 4. Check each department listing for entry times.

Q: *Can I enter exhibits in more than one department?*

A: An individual item can only be entered in one department and most departments limit the number of entries from any one individual. Individuals are not, however, limited to the number of departments in which they may submit entries. Each department requires an individual entry form.

Q: *How far in advance must I enter an exhibit?*

A: Deadlines vary for individual departments. Although livestock deadlines are throughout the summer, most non-livestock exhibit deadlines are one to seven days before the start of the fair. Refer to individual department listings.

Q: *What types of prizes/awards can I win?*

A: The types of awards/prizes vary by department. Although some departments give nominal cash premiums and trophies, all departments award ribbons.

Q: *How are the exhibits judged?*

A: Exhibits are judged on their appearance, quality, color, and all other attributes normally associated with this type of exhibit. The judging is done by experienced judges, who are specialized in that particular field.

Q: *Whom do I call if I have questions?*

A: Most department listings include the name and telephone number of the Superintendent involved in that department. They would be happy to answer your questions. If you are unable to reach them, call the Southwest Washington Fair Office at 360-740-1495.

Q: *What do I do when I bring my exhibit to the fairgrounds?*

A: All exhibits should be taken to the appropriate building; at that point you will receive help from the "Department Superintendent". All buildings will be visibly marked.

Q: *I would like to volunteer at the fair, who do I contact?*

A: It takes hundreds of volunteers to put on a fair every year. Whether you have a specific area of interest or just want to help out any way that you can, call the Southwest Washington Fair Office at 360-740-1495. We will be delighted to match you with one of the areas that we need help in.

AIMS AND PURPOSES OF SOUTHWEST WASHINGTON FAIR



AUTHORIZATION

RCW 15.76.100 – Declaration of public interest – Allocation of state funds authorized. It is hereby declared that it is in the public interest to hold agricultural fairs, including the exhibition of livestock and agricultural produce of all kinds, as well as related arts and manufactures; including products of the farm home and educational contest, displays, and demonstrations designed to train youth and to promote the welfare of farm people and rural living. Fairs qualifying hereunder shall be eligible for allocations from the state fair fund and for capital

funding when appropriated to the department of agriculture, as provided in this chapter. [2012 c 221 § 1; 1961 c 61 § 1.]

GENERAL RULES

The Southwest Washington Fair is the official Fair of Lewis County. It is the objective of the Fair to provide quality competition, and a diversified program. The Southwest Washington Fair encourages participation of competitive exhibits; however, when limitations of space, facilities, and time occur, priorities will be set according to: 1. Area residency, 2. Previous participation, and 3. Quality and diversity of exhibit.

The management reserves the final and absolute right to alter, interpret, or change the rules and regulations as may become necessary; also to determine all matters, questions, and differences that may arise in or out of an incident at the Fair without notification to the public.

Management also reserves the right to remove any exhibitor not complying with Fair rules and policy.

COMMERCIAL EXHIBITORS

All commercial space is assigned by contract through the Fair Office. Contracts specify exact rules, regulations, and payment deadlines. Commercial application packets are available from the Fair Office.

LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS

Show rules and operations are established by each department. Fair management reminds animal exhibitors good showmanship includes public education, cooperation, and herdsmanship. The Fair's minimum health requirements are the same as the recommended minimum health requirements

by the State Veterinarian. The Fair Veterinarian will have the final say on the animal's health, ability to be shown, and fairgrounds livestock health requirements.

NOTE: The Department of Agriculture has issued our fair a blanket permit #91-WA 27374 for out-of-state exhibitor's use only. As an out-of-state exhibitor, your veterinarian need not call the Department of Agriculture if this permit number is used on the certificate of veterinary inspections.

- A. Identification of animals, breeds, farm, etc. is good for all.
- B. Cooperation with other exhibitors and superintendent.
- C. Good herdsman ship creates a pleasant, safe area to view. Public hours are 10 AM to 10 PM Tuesday through Thursday, 10 AM to 11 PM Friday & Saturday, and 10 AM to 7 PM Sunday.
- D. Honesty and fairness are a part of showmanship. Misrepresentation of ownership, animals, or other acts to discredit or give an advantage may result in forfeiture of entry fees, prizes, and premiums or expulsion from the Southwest Washington Fair.
- E. Because of crowded conditions and public viewing of animals, only animals being shown are allowed on the fairgrounds.
- F. The use of alcohol on the Fairgrounds is prohibited. Its use may result in forfeiture of all premiums and future exhibitor status.
- G. No dogs allowed in the barns.
- H. Entry deadlines will be strictly adhered to. No late entries will be accepted.
- I. No selling of animals allowed during the Fair unless prior arrangements have been made, i.e. commercial space. **NO "FOR SALE"** signs allowed on pens, stalls, or coops, etc.

- 1. Entry fees must accompany forms.
- 2. Withdrawal of exhibit after entry fees have been paid will result in loss of entry fees.
- 3. Entry fees will only be refunded to animal exhibits with a signed statement from a veterinarian, prior to the Fair, that the animal will pose a health threat to other animals in the barn. Refunds will be mailed after the Fair.
- 4. Disqualification from Fair Veterinarian will result in forfeiting entry fees.

PREMIUMS

The Southwest Washington Fair will utilize a premium point system for open class, 4-H, and FFA. The amount listed after the prizes are the points awarded to that ribbon. Some departments are paid in straight point value. Our premium budget will be divided into three sections: open class, 4-H, and FFA. Each group will have a percentage of the budget. The points for each group will be totaled and the total divided into the premium dollars available to determine the pay-out per point. Over the past 10 years, pay-out has been between \$0.09 and \$0.28 per point.

EXHIBITOR NUMBER

Exhibitor numbers will be assigned by the Southwest Washington Fair online entry system.

EXHIBITOR ADMISSION AND PARKING TICKETS (OPEN CLASS ONLY)

1. Exhibitor admission tickets and parking tickets are available only to individuals who have to work with their exhibits during the Fair or are required by the Fair to be on the grounds. Exhibitor tickets are not available to individuals who have static exhibits at the fair such as Hobbies & Crafts, Living Arts, Jr. and Sr. Art, Photography, Agriculture, Baled Hay, and Grange.
2. Three one-day exhibitor admission tickets will be provided to each open class livestock exhibitor at no charge. Participants in the Sheep Department Ladies & Lads Lead Competition will receive a single-day admission ticket and parking ticket. Additional tickets may be purchased depending on the number of livestock entries. Discount exhibitor tickets are available for the exhibitor only. Admission and parking tickets are on sale at the Fair Office beginning July 18th. Admission and parking tickets can also be purchased at the Guest Services booth beginning the weekend before Fair.
3. Exhibitor admission tickets cannot be purchased at the Fair gates. You must have a ticket with you to pass through the gate or pay regular Fair admission.
4. Exhibitor parking passes are sold on a season basis or semi-seasonal basis only. No single day tickets are available. One livestock parking pass **per household** is available to each exhibitor at no charge. This parking pass is only accepted in the livestock parking area. Additional livestock parking passes can be purchased for \$7.50 and \$15.00.
5. You can purchase tickets ahead of time and have them mailed to you or waiting at the Southwest Washington Fair Guest Services Booth. Please use the form below and mail it to Southwest Washington Fair, 2555 North National Avenue, Chehalis, WA 98532.
6. No refunds or exchanges on tickets or passes.

All tickets must be ordered before July 24, 2017.

EXHIBITOR ADMISSION TICKETS (4-H AND FFA ONLY)

1. 4-H and FFA exhibitor tickets are available to youth involved in those programs and who place exhibits at the Fair.
2. 4-H and FFA tickets are available to 4-H and FFA exhibitors starting the weekend before the Fair at the Guest Services Booth. You must have a signed authorization slip in order to purchase tickets.
3. You cannot purchase exhibitor tickets at the gate. You must have your exhibitor ticket with you to pass through the gate or pay regular Fair admission.
4. 4-H and FFA Exhibitor tickets are available at \$2.00 per exhibitor per day. 4-H and FFA parents pay \$5.00 per person per day.
5. There are no refunds or exchanges on any tickets.
6. The Guest Services Booth will begin selling 4-H and FFA tickets Thursday before fair daily from 10 AM to 5 PM.

CAMPING

Southwest Washington Fair has three campgrounds available for camping: **Bridle Acres**, located at the west side of the fairgrounds along the railroad tracks, **Fair Meadows**, located at the north end of the fairgrounds behind the Horse Arena, and **Oak Grove**, which is at the south end of the fairgrounds. These are the only three locations where overnight camping is allowed.

Reservations and Fees

We accept reservations on a first come, first serve basis beginning on Monday, January 9, 2017. We require the camping fee be paid on the day the space is reserved. Reservations can be made by calling the Fair Office at 360-740-1495 or in person at our office at 2555 North National Avenue, Chehalis, WA, 98532.

Trailer passes will be mailed after the 15th of July. If you request your passes be held, they may be picked up at the Fair office after July 31st.

There may be additional camping spaces available during the Fair. Please check at the Guest Services booth.

Camping Cancellations

A \$30.00 handling fee is charged on all refunds. If a paid space is cancelled prior to June 30th, a refund may be obtained, minus the \$30.00 handling fee. We are sorry, but we are unable to refund any fees if a space is cancelled after June 30th. Refunds will be mailed within 30 days of the day of cancellation.

Camping Regulations

We provide space for one camping vehicle and one motor vehicle per campsite. Camping may begin Saturday prior to the Fair. Please park your camping vehicle in the corresponding space. We ask that you **not** allow anyone else to camp in your campsite. In order for us to properly patrol and protect our guests, it is important we be aware of who is in each location. If you must cancel, please notify the Fair Office.

Remember to be considerate of your neighbors while camping at the Fair. Please keep your volume down especially in the night and morning hours. The camping areas are patrolled by security and security will report any problems to the Fair Manager. A warning will be issued in this case and camping privileges may be revoked if problems persist. Camping fees are non-refundable under these circumstances.

Water/Electric/Sewage Information

Please Do Not run electrical cords or water hoses beyond your campsite. For the safety of all persons using our campgrounds this policy must be adhered to or camping privileges may be revoked.

The Southwest Washington Fair asks that you refrain from excessive power and air conditioning use during your stay with us due to our limited electrical capacity in our camping areas. *Thank you for your cooperation.*

We have no dumping facilities on site. For the health and safety of our guests, we do not allow dumping of any kind of waste onto the ground. There are local portable waste pumping services available for your convenience.

We hope you enjoy your camping experience with us. And remember if you have concerns; please address them to the Fair Office or the Guest Services Booth.

GENERAL RULES

Entries are open to registered Campfire Boys & Girls and Boy & Girl Scouts. All entries must have been completed in the last year and may not have been entered in this fair before.

All entries must be hand-crafted – the only exception will be those items that are decorated on, such as clothing and outfits for dolls.

All artwork and those items intended for hanging must have proper hanging devices attached.

Entries must be neat and clean. Items made at school are acceptable as long as there are no grades or comments on them. If there is a name visible, it must be covered.

If the entry is small, fragile, or loose, it must be fastened to a stable base or mount. This is up to the individual before bringing the item to the fair on entry day.

For those entries that are ceremonial gowns, if you do not want them pinned, a dress form of some kind will be accepted for display.

Entries must be picked up at the above stated release time. Superintendent may limit entries due to space.

No judging will take place and no premiums will be awarded. Participation ribbons will be awarded to individuals and/or groups.

**SOUTHWEST WASHINGTON
YOUTH CHALLENGES**

Participation in all HASC Youth Challenges will be based on the following criteria:

1. Applicant is a youth between 9 to 19 years of age as of January 1, 2017.
2. A fully completed entry form has been turned in the Monday, August 7, 2017, prior to haul-in to fair to qualify as a pre-entry or for Non-Southwest Washington Fair youth by August 1, 2017. An entry form must be submitted for each rider/horse combination. More than one entry form may be submitted. Youth may qualify with more than one horse throughout the year. An entry form may be submitted for each show they have attended. Any incomplete entry form will be rejected.
3. The individual class prerequisite has been met. Prerequisites include the class must be a canter/lope class as well as the rider and horse combination must have placed 1st through 5th in the class type (minimum of 5 horses). The placement must be in the top half of the class (i.e., 4th place out of 8 horses qualifies; 4th place out of 4 horses does not qualify). This must be a placing in an individual class, not an overall event or high-point placing. If there is a question if the placing qualifies, submit the entry form and HASC will make a determination. The placement must have been on or after January 1, 2017. Class types are: English Equitation, Stock Seat/Western Equitation, Trail, and Western Games
4. Space is available. All challenge class sizes will be a total of 15, except for gaming which will be 20. Southwest Washington Fair youth will be considered for participation in 10 (15 for gaming) available slots. Half of the Southwest Washington Fair youth slots will be drawn from pre-entries received by August 7, 2017. The remaining of the pre-entries will go into a general pool to fill the remaining slots with all the other entries received until the day of the challenge. Five slots are guaranteed to Non-Southwest Washington Fair youth. If there are more than five qualified entries; participation will be decided by random draw on August 2, 2017. If these five slots are not filled by August 1, 2017 by non-Southwest Washington Fair youth, the slots may be filled by youth attending the Southwest Washington Fair. HASC will conduct all random drawings.
5. Parent or guardian has signed Southwest Washington Fairgrounds release on the entry form.

Management reserves the right to ask any applicant to verify their prerequisite for any challenge. Management also reserves the right to exclude any applicant for safety concerns.

For non-Southwest Washington Fair participants, haul in and vet check is between 6:00 to 7:00 PM or between 9:30 to 10:30 AM depending on start time on the day of the challenge.

For those applicants attending the Southwest Washington Fair, a list of the potential challenge applicant pool for the day will be posted at the HASC office. Applicants may confirm their entry has been accepted for the challenge.

GENERAL RULES

1. **CLEARLY MARK ENTRY TAG IF YOU ARE YOUTH (17 & UNDER) OR ADULT (18 & OVER).**
2. **EXHIBITORS ARE LIMITED TO ONE ENTRY IN EACH CLASS OF EACH DIVISION, UNLESS OTHERWISE STATED.**
3. Exhibits will be judged by the Danish method, according to the standards of blue, red, and white ribbon classes. Only blue and red ribbon classes will receive points toward cash awards.
4. Open Class General Entry Forms may be secured at the fair office or from fair's website in advance of the fair. (www.southwestwashingtonfair.net)
 Entry Tags may be picked up at the fair office.
 The following rules should be observed:
 - a. **A separate entry form must be used for each division.**
 - b. All exhibits in the same division should be entered on the same form.
 - c. Entry forms and tags should be filled out before entering exhibits. No pre-entries or late entries.
 - d. The following information should be printed or typed clearly on each entry form and tag. Complete name and address, number of department, division and class, and name of exhibit.
5. Checkout time is 7:30 PM – 9 PM Sunday or 9 AM – 1 PM Monday after Fair.
6. No entry fee will be charged and no admission ticket will be given to any exhibitor.
7. Any article exhibited should not have been exhibited before at the Southwest Washington Fair. Exhibits must be entered in the name of the maker and made within the last 3 years, except canning which must be processed since last year's fair.
8. Special awards and Best in Class will be judges' choice.
9. Exhibits must meet the requirements for the Special Award to be eligible for consideration.
10. **Exhibits that are soiled or dirty will not receive a ribbon.** Clothing may have been worn if it is laundered or cleaned before being exhibited.
11. Judging of exhibits will take place Thursday, August 10th before the Fair.
12. **Any foods that have been on open display must be discarded by the Superintendent for food safety reasons. They cannot be returned to the exhibitor. Canned goods will be returned.**
13. \$1.00 will be given for the exhibit judged best in class.

SPECIAL AWARDS WILL BE OFFERED AGAIN

Special Award Living Arts Person of the Year

A Superintendent's award of \$25 will be given to the person who enters 1 item in a minimum of 7 or maximum of 8 divisions. Only 1 item per division may be entered as a "LAP". 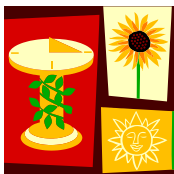

The purpose of this department is to demonstrate the value of hobbies and crafts, as an aid to education and art, as a means of preserving historical background and for the development of craftsmanship. The attractive arrangement of exhibits so widely diversified in character governs the success of the Hobbies and Crafts Department. Any leisure time activity of general interest and worthy of recommendation to others may be entered as a hobby or craft.

Entries will be accepted as long as space is available.

GENERAL RULES

- Any individual is eligible to enter his personal hobby or craft.
- If your exhibit is set up in a display case we recommend using a backdrop that will enhance the appearance of the entry.
- A person who sells or teaches any craft must note this on the entry form.
- Hobbies and crafts that have been shown before cannot be exhibited in succeeding years unless exhibit is entirely new. No display can be exhibited a second year.
- Entries will only be accepted on Friday before the Fair from 11 AM to 1 PM and Saturday before Fair, from 10 AM to 2 PM (space is limited, therefore, department will close when full) at the Community Events Building. Space for exhibits needing more than one shelf or a large area are to be prearranged with the Superintendent prior to fair.
- Release of exhibits will be 7:30 – 9 PM Sunday during the Fair and 10 AM – 1:00 PM Monday after Fair.
- Collections must be set up by exhibitor; the presentation is part of the judging. Exhibitors are encouraged to bring fabric, velon, boxes and cans to enhance their display. Educational or information on the collection that would assist in making a better display is encouraged. Collections mounted on cardboard for hanging should be covered with cellophane for protection.
- Exhibits that are soiled will not receive ribbons.
- See additional rules under classes.
- The Southwest Washington Fair is in no way responsible for damage or loss; however, every precaution will be taken by personnel in charge to avoid damage and loss. Please secure loose parts with glue, putty or tape.
- Superintendent has the right to disqualify any exhibit in the hobby building based on worthiness to the department.
- Superintendent reserves the right to limit size of exhibit. Large cases must accommodate at least two exhibitors. An exhibit may be moved to accommodate display case usage and space.

- No Home Ec items will be accepted. *See Living Arts Department, Division A02 "Home Arts" for other areas.* Note: Entry day for Living Arts is Wednesday, August 10th.

GENERAL RULES

1. Paintings must be entered Thursday before Fair 10:00 AM to 5:00 PM or Friday before Fair from 2:00 PM to 7:00 PM at the Expo Hall Building.
2. Prizes will be awarded at the discretion of the judges. Judges will pick, from all entries, a fair theme winner. Judges will change every 3 years.
3. Pictures must be matted or suitably framed. Clips must be preapproved. Framed art must have properly attached wires, preferably eye screws. Glass (floating art) frames and plastic frames are often not able to be hung with wires, glass frames are heavy and hard to work with. Tape does not hold the wire with the weight of ANY frame – no taped wires can be accepted. Construction paper and poster board can be used to matte artwork. Matted work does not need hangers.
4. A fair entry tag must be attached on reverse side. Tags and Open Class General Entry Forms are available at the Southwest Washington Fair office prior to entry day. Open Class General Entry Forms are also available at <http://southwestwashingtonfair.org>.
5. Three (3) entries per CLASS may be entered by any one person with a maximum of eight (8) entries.

- All work must be original subject matter. Classroom work acceptable as long as it is not a copy of any artist's or teacher's work.
- No copies from pictures, comic books, magazines; no paint by number paintings are accepted.
- Work previously hung at the Fair is not acceptable.
- Exhibitors must be 18 years of age or under.
- Paintings may be picked up Sunday from 7 PM to 9 PM or Monday 10 AM – noon. You must have your entry ticket to pick up artwork.

Although all possible care will be taken to safeguard entries, the Southwest Washington Fair does not assume responsibility for theft, loss, or damage to entries.

Keep in mind framing and the title of the work is a part of your presentation and will play a part in the judges' decision as well as composition, skill, creativity, etc.

The art work is divided into three classes: Professional, Advanced, and Amateur.

All rules will be enforced, no exceptions.

- Entry fee: \$2.00 per entry.
- Each artist may enter up to three (3) items per CLASS, with a maximum of nine (9) entries per artist.
- Entries will not be accepted that have been previously shown at the Southwest Washington Fair.
- All artwork must have been completed within the last three years to be judged with main entries. CLASS 11 is a special CLASS for older artwork.
- Artwork must not be copies of other artwork, other non-original sources, magazines, published photography, patterns, paint by numbers, or class work. Any computer or computer-enhanced art must be labeled as such. Patterned works or paint-by-number works may be entered in the Hobbies and Crafts Department.
- Paintings must be framed and securely wired for hanging. No saw tooth hangers for safety reasons. Clips must be preapproved. Any glass or heavy painting will not be hung for safety reasons unless specifically approved by the Superintendent at entry time. The item may need to be judged leaning or laid down depending on the individual piece.
- Exhibits that are not adequately prepared for display will not be accepted.** Art Department staff **CANNOT** reframe or rewire your art work. Feel free to call the superintendent prior to entry day for advice or help. If time permits and there are available volunteers, there may be some help available on entry day.
- The circumference of any piece should not exceed 264" not including frame. Miniatures not to exceed 36" in circumference, not including frame.

- At judge's discretion, premium points will be awarded as follows: 1st – 40; 2nd – 30; and 3rd – 20. Judges Choice, Best in Show, Special Awards, and Superintendent Award will be given at judges' and superintendent's discretion. Fair Theme will be awarded to the painting or artwork judges feel best represents theme. People's Choice will be given daily. Once a work receives People's Choice Award it is no longer eligible for the award.
- Exhibitors must be over 18 years old.
- Southwest Washington Fair will receive a 10% commission on all sales. The artist is provided with wide spread exposure and an opportunity for sales. Pick up of sale items must be after 7:00 PM, Sunday, August 20, 2017.
- All pictures must be titled.
- No entries may be picked up prior to Sunday, August 20, 2017 at 7:00 PM
NO EXCEPTIONS
- The judging will be closed to everyone but authorized fair personnel.

1. Each entry must be the work of the exhibitor and must have been taken within the last five years. Photos may not have been entered previously at the Southwest Washington Fair. If a photo is recognized by the judges as previously entered, it may be passed over.
2. A maximum of 6 color, 4 black and white (monochrome), 4 special effects, 4 digital images, 1 photo editing, and 2 fair theme photographs may be entered.
3. Photographs must be between a minimum of 64 square inches and a maximum of 320 square inches. Each photo must be mounted on a plain, rigid matte board. The maximum size of the matte board is 320 square inches and the maximum width or height is 40 inches. Examples of acceptable matte board sizes includes: 5"x14", 8"x8" (flush mount), 8"x10", 8"x12", 11"x14", 16"x20", 16"x16" 12"x24" and up to 8"x40". The exhibitor should strive to make the width and height fit the subject for the best composition. Photos received which do not meet the size specifications listed WILL BE DISQUALIFIED. Photos **must** be mounted securely as they are displayed in an unheated building and are subject to humid and damp conditions. Please do not use **double stick tape** to mount photos. Crafter's multi-purpose spray adhesive works well. A second matte surrounding the print is acceptable. No entries mounted on wood, covered with glass, plastic or framed will be accepted. **Exhibitor's, please apply hook side 1-inch Velcro on the back side four corners.**
4. Digital images may be submitted on a disk or emailed to swwfphoto@gmail.com. A SWWF Open Class General Entry Form is required for digital images at the location and time as stated above. Disks will not be returned. Files must be in a .jpg format (jpeg). The .jpg compressed image file size is to be a maximum of 1 MB (Mega Byte). The maximum image pixel size is 1200 pixels in the horizontal and 800 pixels in the vertical dimension. Images received which do not meet the size specifications listed WILL BE DISQUALIFIED. Open Class General Entry Forms may be found at <http://southwestwashingtonfair.org> or at the Fair Office.
5. Mark each matte board (**on back**) or CD with the name, city, and phone number of the entrant, title of the image, division, class, and CLASS. If there is any doubt, mark what side is up. No names may be on the front of the mounting or photo for purposes of judging and presentation. Descriptions or titles may be used.
6. Special effects (or altered) photos are those that are obviously altered from their original form or show special effects created in the camera or in photo editing. Some examples includes colorizing, toning, collage, photo composites, HDR, light painting, long time exposures, trick photography, and more.
7. Photo Editing is an opportunity for photographers to show the editing and photo creation process. Show a beginning and final image and explain or show what was done to arrive at the final image. The photographer may also include information about special camera settings, lighting, timing, location or other special conditions that added to the final image. The entire single display shall meet the photo size requirements listed above.
8. Entry fees and completely filled out Open Class General Entry Forms must accompany photos: \$2.00 per photo.
9. All possible care will be taken, but no responsibility will be accepted by the Southwest Washington Fair for loss or damage to entries, in storage or at exhibition.
10. Unless otherwise specified, permission to reproduce is assumed. (One time only)
11. Entries will be accepted in the Photography Department, located in the Photography Barn, at the Southwest Washington Fairgrounds on Friday, August 10 from 5:00 PM to 6:30 PM and Saturday, August 11 from 12 noon to 4:00 PM.
12. Right to Refuse – All photos must be suitable for viewing by all age groups. Should questions arise concerning eligibility of any entry; the Fair Management's decision will be considered as final.

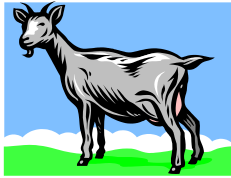

GENERAL RULES

1. Open Class Livestock Entry Forms and entry fees must be received by July 10. Late entries will be accepted as space allows. Entry fee is \$6.00 per animal and must accompany application form, or form will be returned. Entry fees are not refundable. Substitutions are permitted in same breeds, same CLASS only. Open Class Livestock Entry Forms can be found at <http://southwestwashingtonfair.net> or at the Fair Office.
2. Entries are accepted on a first-come, first-served basis, according to date of postmark. Mail entries to the Southwest Washington Fair Office, 2555 North National Ave., Chehalis, WA 98532.
3. Entries will be accepted until space is full. In county entries will be given preference.
4. Any exhibitor (whose entries have been accepted) failing to notify the Superintendent or Fair Office they have decided not to exhibit at all, will have their exhibiting privileges suspended for the following year's fair. Entry fees will not be returned.
5. Animals must be in place and checked in by 8 PM Monday, before the fair and will remain until released Thursday evening. Pens will be available Monday before the Fair.
6. The Fair's minimum health requirements are the same as the recommended minimum health requirements by the State Veterinarian. The Fair Veterinarian will be on the grounds on Monday before Fair at 9 AM. It will be the veterinarian's duty to refuse entry to any animal showing signs of communicable disease, including but not limited to the following: pink-eye, ringworm, open abscesses, sore-mouth (in any stage), lice, foot-rot, etc. The Fair Veterinarian will have the final say on the animal's health, ability to be shown, and fairgrounds livestock health requirements.
7. Sawdust will be furnished by the Fair. The exhibitor is expected to clean pens daily and see that pens are kept in a neat and odor-free state at all times.
8. An exhibitor shall be defined as any individual, farm, or family group that shall exhibit their animals jointly. Each exhibitor shall have a different exhibitor number and there shall be no sharing of animals by different exhibitors in group classes.
9. No exhibitor may receive more than two premiums in any one CLASS. Only two entries per group class, per exhibitor, per breed will be permitted.
10. 4-H & FFA may exhibit in open class if space is available and if their animals are housed in the designated 4-H & FFA areas. The exhibitor is expected to comply with all other Open Class requirements.
11. Pen space is assigned based on the number of animals entered. Non-entered animals will not be allowed in the barn. All tack must be stored in the space designated by the Superintendent. No dogs allowed in barns.
12. The Southwest Washington Dairy Goat Association will sponsor herdsman awards of \$20.00 for 1st, \$15.00 for 2nd, \$10.00 for 3rd place, \$7.50 for 4th and \$5.00 for 5th. Award money to be paid directly to exhibitor from the Dairy Goat Association.
13. Junior and Senior shows are separately sanctioned.

14. All animals must be registered in the Scrapie Program and have a Scrapie Certificate upon arrival.

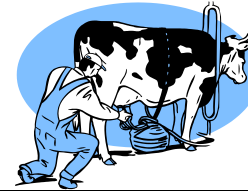

GENERAL RULES

1. Completed Open Class Livestock Entry Forms (available at <http://southwestwashingtonfair.net> or at the Southwest Washington Fair Office) shall be in the Fair Office by July 29. Superintendent reserves right to reject entries if stall space has been filled prior to the closing date of entries.
2. All open class dairy cattle will be exhibited during the first half of the Fair. (Tuesday through Thursday, August 15 - 17). Animals may enter the grounds on Monday, August 14, between 8 AM – 8 PM. Animals will be excused Thursday at 6:00 PM. Tack may be carried out Thursday at 5:00 PM.
3. Exhibitors are required to keep quarters and cattle clean and neat. No animals other than dairy exhibits will be allowed in the barn.
4. Owners will be responsible for entire care of their animals. Bedding will be furnished by the Fair. Owners will be required to secure their own feed for exhibits. Someone representing each exhibitor will be in the barns at 6 AM for milking animals. Wheelbarrows will not be furnished, but small tools may be checked out. For clipping chutes please notify the superintendent.
5. Entry fee: \$10.00 per animal through August 1; \$15.00 per animal after August 1. Entry fees are not refundable.
6. Substitutions will be allowed, but will only be accepted until 10 AM Tuesday, the first day of the Fair. Substitution cards must be completed.
7. Cattle entered in this department must be accompanied by registration papers which will be checked to the animals Tuesday beginning at 10 AM. Transfer evidence of animals recently acquired and absolute proof of purchase must be presented at registration paper check. All animals in barn must be exhibited and shown.
8. All 4–H and FFA exhibitors entering open class competition must present registration papers to the dairy department superintendent Tuesday at 3 PM in the dairy barn. Failure to abide by this rule will disqualify exhibitor and entry fees will be forfeited.
9. In any class in which only one exhibitor is represented, the judge may in his discretion, award premium or premiums of such grade as the exhibit deserves.
10. All animals shown in group classes must have been shown in individual open classes.
11. All entries, whether owned by one person or more than one person (individually or jointly), which are maintained on one farm, are considered as a single exhibitor in both individual and group classes.
12. The Fair Veterinarian will be on grounds at unloading area and livestock barns on Monday, the day before Fair, from 8 AM until 8 PM. It is his duty to refuse admission to any animal showing evidence of communicable disease, including warts, ringworm, pneumonia, etc. The Fair's minimum health requirements are the same as the recommended minimum health requirements by the State Veterinarian. The Fair Veterinarian will have the final say on the animal's health, ability to be showed and fairgrounds livestock health requirements. BRUCELLOSIS – All female animals must be blood tested (certificate in hand) or calfood vaccinated.
13. Rigid compliance with Fair Veterinarian decisions will be compulsory through the run of the Fair.
 - a. Animals will not be accepted in any livestock departments after 8 PM Monday before Fair opens.

- b. Animal health treatment required while at the fairgrounds shall be the sole obligation of the exhibitor. Any veterinarian of exhibitor's choice may be called.
 - c. Any animal showing evidence of communicable disease after having been admitted to the barns shall be removed at any time at the request of the Fair Veterinarian.
15. It shall be understood by the exhibitor that if at any time during the course of the fair his animal seriously detracts from the overall esthetic value of the department, the fair management shall request the Fair Veterinarian to dismiss the animal.
 16. Any exhibitor requesting the removal of an animal at any time during the fair for health reasons must have the animal examined by the Fair Veterinarian and abide by his decision. Failure to do so will result in forfeiture of premiums and exhibiting privileges in the future.
 17. Judging will be done Wednesday during the Fair at 10 AM sharp. If an animal is not ready to enter the ring when it is called, the exhibitor will automatically forfeit his entry fee paid and will be scratched from the judge's sheet for that competition.
AM with alternating classes.
 18. Lunch break when judge deems appropriate.
 19. A herdsman will be allowed to enter a breeder's animal in the name of the herdsman. Breeder's name must also be shown on the entry form.
 20. All departments must be in show shape by 9 AM.
 21. Animals in 4-H and FFA Departments will be eligible to exhibit the same animal or animals in the same or similar CLASSES or classes in the open class dairy department. All 4-H AND FFA MEMBERS exhibiting in open class dairy department must conform in a strict sense to those rules and regulations applicable to the open class dairy department. This includes the payment of entry fees and entry deadline. All animals exhibited in the open class department must be stalled in the 4-H and FFA livestock buildings and adhere to the rules and regulations set forth by FFA and 4-H dairy departments.
 22. Anyone not in compliance with the above may be refused entry the following year.
 23. Premier breeder & exhibitor will be judged on the top six animals.
 24. There must be one or more entries in a class to qualify for premiums. If there is only 1 entry per class it will be given \$25.00.
 25. No exhibitor may receive more than two payments in any one class.
 26. Exhibitors may not bed down or setup any type of sleeping apparatus in the exhibit area.
 27. Parking regulations will be strictly enforced. All vehicles must be off the fairgrounds by 9:45 AM unless prior arrangements have been made with Fair Management.
 28. A tent, no larger than 10'x10'x5' high, for exhibitor's personal use or tack storage is acceptable within exhibitor's stall space.
 29. Animals are not to be released except by a vet's recommendation.

SHEEP DEPARTMENT OBJECTIVES

To show the public the variety of breeds of sheep, to encourage the people from the surrounding area to show at the local fair, and provide a presentation of the by-products from the many breeds of sheep. Education of the public is strongly recommended.

GENERAL RULES

1. Open Class Livestock Entry Form (available at <http://southwestwashingtonfair.net> or at the Southwest Washington Fair

Office) must be completed and in the hands of the fair office no later than July 7. Sheep are shown on Saturday during the Fair, starting at 9 AM.

2. Judging will be done in order of the divisions printed in premium book.
3. All breeding animals must be properly registered in the association they represent and must bear the flock tag of the association. Animals not bearing identification appropriate to their association may not be exhibited.
4. Exhibitors will be limited to two entries in single divisions and one entry in group classes. Animals in group classes must have been shown in individual classes. It is not necessary for entries in group classes to identify animals to be shown.
5. An entry fee of \$4.00 per head will be charged and shall accompany the completed Open Class Livestock Entry Form. In the event of a cancellation of entries, the fee is not refundable. Entry fees should be calculated by multiplying the fee times the total number of animals which will be brought to the fair.
6. Sheep shown in the open class section must be in show condition.
7. Sheep will be shown by class. Entries cannot be changed after the paper check on Friday.
8. All flocks exhibited in the open class show must be identified by a sign or other appropriate means throughout the duration of the fair.
9. All animals must remain in place until official release time. No truck or trailers are to be in the sheep area prior to official release time. Violation of these regulations may result in forfeiture of premium money.
10. While the total process of removing sheep from the exhibit area is generally confined to a two-hour period, exhibitors are asked to extend the courtesy of loading first to those who must travel the greatest distance.
11. A display area for sheep pictures and literature will be provided. Exhibitors wishing to publicize their particular breed are encouraged to bring literature with them for display and/or distribution purposes.
12. Exhibitors are encouraged to participate in the Sunday festivities and wool show.
13. Under classes 20 and 21, other registered breeds: each breed will be judged separately for ribbons only. The blue ribbon winner of each breed will then be judged in one class to determine the animal that represents their breed the best. These animals will receive premiums, and the first place ram and ewe will compete for best of show.

ANIMAL HEALTH

1. The Fair Veterinarian will be on the grounds Friday morning at 6 AM to check all animals. Exhibitors must be in attendance at that time. It is the duty of the veterinarian to refuse admission to any animal showing evidence of any communicable disease. The Fair's minimum health requirements are the same as the recommended minimum health requirements by the State Veterinarian. The Fair Veterinarian will have the final say on the animal's health, ability to be shown, and fairgrounds livestock health requirements.
2. Animal health treatment required while at the fairgrounds shall be the sole obligation of the exhibitor. Any veterinarian of the exhibitor's choice may be called.
3. Any animal showing signs of a communicable disease after having been admitted to the barns shall be removed at any time at the request of the Fair Veterinarian.
4. It shall be understood by the exhibitor that if at any time during the course of the fair his/her animal seriously detracts from the overall esthetic value of the department, the officers of the fair will dismiss the animal.
5. An exhibitor requesting the removal of an animal at any time during the fair for health reasons must have the animal examined by the Fair Veterinarian. You must abide by his decision. Failure to do so will result in forfeiture of premiums and exhibiting privileges in the future.
Notice: Scrapie identification tags are required for all sheep regardless of breed or state of origin.

9. All exhibitors are encouraged to participate in the Lads' and Ladies' contest, including non-sheep exhibitors.
10. A special award will be presented to the entrant with the best self-constructed garment in each class.

GENERAL RULES

1. All open class cattle will be exhibited during the second half of the Fair. (Friday through Sunday, August 18 - 20). Animals may enter the grounds on Friday, August 18, between 6 AM and Noon. Hardship cases may contact the Superintendent for assistance. Animals will be excused Sunday at 6:00 PM. Tack may be carried out Sunday at 5:00 PM. Judging schedules for each breed will be posted on Friday. Show Programs for each breed will be available on Friday.
2. The Open Class Livestock Entry Form must be filled out, printed, or typed, with all information requested, and must be in the Fair Office no later than July 15. Entries must be accompanied by an entry fee of \$15.00 per animal entered. No charge for CLASSES 17, 18, 19, and 20. There is a \$15.00 fee for Class 1. **ENTRY FEE AFTER July 15th WILL BE \$20.00 PER HEAD.** Failure to exhibit an animal entered will result in forfeiture of the entry fee.
3. All cattle exhibited must be accompanied by the animal's original registration papers (**No copies will be accepted**) and have a readable tattoo. Papers will be checked. Tattoos will be checked at random.
4. All entries must meet the health requirements currently prevailing with the State Department of Agriculture. The Fair's minimum health requirements are the same as the recommended minimum health requirements by the State Veterinarian. All females over 6 months of age must be vaccinated for Brucellosis. The Fair Veterinarian will have the final say on the animal's health, ability to be shown, and fairgrounds livestock health requirements.
5. Incoming animals will be screened visually for communicable diseases – warts, ringworm, etc. The Fair Veterinarian will inspect the cattle on Friday morning and any animal not passing this inspection and any subsequent inspections will be excused. Any exhibitor requesting the removal of an animal at any time during the Fair for health reasons must have the animal examined by the Fair Veterinarian and abide by his decision. Veterinarian services requested by an exhibitor during the Fair shall be the exhibitor's responsibility.
6. All animals must be double tied and all bulls 9 months and older must have a nose ring when being moved and shown.
7. Adequate space will be allocated each exhibitor for animals, tack, clipping chutes, and feed. All clipping chutes will be kept out of the aisles except on show day. Bedding (sawdust or shavings) will be furnished by the Fair with all feed the responsibility of the exhibitor. **Due to power restrictions, if you have a generator, you may want to bring it.**
8. All exhibitors shall have their area in show shape by 9 AM each day of the Fair. It shall also be understood that if at any time during the Fair an exhibitor's animal seriously detracts from the overall esthetic value of the Fair, Fair officials may dismiss such exhibits.
9. All 4-H and FFA registered beef animals may be exhibited in the open beef shows provided the animals are entered according to the rules of the open beef shows and the appropriate Open Class Livestock Entry Form and entry

- fee are submitted to the Fair Office. 4-H and FFA entries will be housed in the 4-H and FFA barns.
- Absolutely no intoxicating liquors or the consumption thereof will be permitted on the fairgrounds. Further, any exhibitor held in violation of Fair rules will forfeit entry fees, premiums, awards, and/or be expelled from the fairgrounds.
 - No exhibitor may receive more than two premiums in any one class.
 - Premier Exhibitor must have two (2) breeders with a total of ten (10) head represented in the breed.

GENERAL RULES

Mail Southwest Washington Fair Open Class Livestock Entry Form with \$6.00 (PER ANIMAL) stall fee to the Southwest Washington Fair Office, 2555 North National Ave, Chehalis, WA 98532. Fair entry fees are nonrefundable.

Mail show entry fees of \$10.00 (PER ANIMAL) with a copy of the fair entry form to: Shirley Hasbrouck, 460 W Deegan Rd W, Shelton, WA 98584.

Any exhibitor whose entries have been accepted, but CANNOT attend show, MUST notify the superintendent or the Southwest Washington Fair Office so your privileges are not suspended the following year.

Animals must be in place by 10 AM, Friday, August 18 and will remain until released Sunday evening. Pens will be available 8 AM Friday morning.

The Fair's minimum health requirements are the same as the state veterinarian. The Fair Veterinarian will be on the grounds by 8 AM. It will be the veterinarian's duty to refuse entry to any animal showing signs of communicable disease, including, but not limited to the following: pink-eye, ringworm, open abscesses, sore mouth (in any stage), lice, hoof rot, etc. The fair veterinarian will have the final say on the animal's health, ability to be shown, adhering to the fairground's livestock health requirements. All animals must be registered in the Scrapie Program and have a Scrapie Certificate upon arrival.

All pens are to be cleaned daily and kept in a neat and odor-free condition at all times.

An exhibitor shall be defined as any individual, farm, or family group who exhibit their animals jointly. Each exhibitor shall have a different exhibitor number and there shall be no sharing of animals by different exhibitors in group classes.

No exhibitor may receive more than two premiums in any one class. Only one entry per group division, per exhibitor, per breed will be permitted.

All exhibitors are expected to comply with all open class requirements.

Pen space is assigned based on the number of animals entered. Non-entered animals will not be allowed in the barn. All tack must be stored in the space designated by the superintendent. No dogs allowed in the barn.

Department Rules

This is an ABGA show sanctioned by the ABGA with rules to govern. All paperwork must be checked in with the designated chairperson prior to the start of the show. Scheduled check in for papers will be Friday August 18 from 8 AM to 10 AM. The base day for computing the age of animals will be August 14.

Pens should be cleaned by 9 AM. Safety netting required for all kids under one year of age.

DIVISION DESCRIPTIONS

Herdsmanship

To promote interest in presenting an attractive Boer goat display, first, second, and third place awards of rosettes will be given to Boer goat exhibitors by the Southwest Washington Fair. All exhibits will be inspected daily during fair and scored on condition of animals, cleanliness of pens, and neatness of aisles. Particular attention will be given to orderliness of areas used for tack and equipment. Sportsmanship and cooperation of the exhibitor will be taken into consideration also.

Premiums for all CLASSES will be as follows: First - \$13.00, Second - \$11.00, Third - \$9.00. No more than 2 animals per class may be entered.
