





AUTHORIZATION

RCW 15.76.100 - Declaration of public interest - Allocation of state funds authorized. It is hereby declared that it is in the public interest to hold agricultural fairs, including the exhibition of livestock and agricultural produce of all kinds, as well as related arts and manufactures; including products of the farm home and educational contest, displays, and demonstrations designed to train youth and to promote the welfare of farm people and rural economic development. Fairs qualifying hereunder shall be eligible for allocations from the state fair fund and for capital funding when appropriated to the department of agriculture, as provided in this chapter. [2018 c 280 § 1; 2012 c 221 § 1; 1961 c 61 § 1.]

JUDGING SCHEDULE PRE-FAIR

Note – If deadlines fall on days when the Extension Office is closed we will accept forms on the following business day.

April 1	Individuals planning to exhibit in 4–H Department must be enrolled as a 4–H member in the project in which they plan to exhibit and/or participate. No exceptions.
April 1	Market Beef animals must be under the care and supervision of the exhibitor.
April 1	Certificate of Intent to sell for a market steer at the Junior Livestock Sale due to sale clerk.
May 1	Dairy and Beef breeding and Horses must be under the care and supervision of the exhibitor.
May 1	4–H Horse certificate on any horse to be shown due in WSU Lewis County Extension 4–H office
May 1	4–H Dairy Certificates on any dairy animal to be shown due in WSU Lewis County Extension 4–H office

June 1	Goats, sheep, swine, rabbit, poultry, dogs, cats, and cavies must be under the care and supervision of the exhibitor.
July 15	last Record Books submitted to the Lewis County 4-H Extension
July 18	Thursday inoffice by 3:00 last Thursday in July for judging. All education posters you wish to display in the barns are due to the Extension Office by 3:00.
July 18	All livestock entry forms, animal science entry forms, and Herdsmanship entry forms due by 3:00 at the Lewis County 4-H Extension office. If entry forms are mailed, they must be postmarked by July 18 th .

- Online entries must contain assigned exhibitor number and name. County I. 4-H'ers are notified after April 1 of their exhibitor number. Out of county exhibitors must obtain an exhibitor number from the Lewis County 4-H Office. Failure to use assigned exhibitor number may result in incorrect premiums or no premiums.
- Exhibitors must participate in fitting and showing in their respective animal J. science division or premiums will not be paid and the exhibitor's animal will not be eligible for any further classes in that division. YOU MUST SHOW YOUR OWN ANIMAL IN FITTING & SHOWING.
- Exhibitors may not remove exhibit(s) before official closing time (without K. prior arrangement or release by Superintendent) as stated in general rules. If exhibits are removed early premiums will be forfeited as will ribbons. Exhibitor will also not be allowed to compete at the state fair.
- Contests and exhibits will be judged according to the Washington L. State University Scorecards. Group placing of blue, red and white will be made - (Group, or Danish Judging System). No exhibit deemed unworthy shall be awarded a placing; the judge's decision is final.
- Exhibitors will receive cash premium for each point earned. Points are Μ. stated under each department. The value per point is dependent upon the grand total of points awarded in the 4-H Department and the premium budget allocated to the 4-H Department by the Southwest Washington Fair. Premium checks will not be issued for premium winnings that are \$2.00 and under.
- 4-H exhibits are entered and displayed at the risk of the exhibitor. The N. Southwest Washington Fair, Washington State University and Lewis County Extension cannot accept responsibility for loss or damage. Exhibits of great sentimental and/or monetary value should be reconsidered by entrant due to the possible hazards of large crowds, the arrangement of the buildings in which the displays are housed, and the great number of exhibits

ANIMAL SCIENCE DIVISIONS STATE 4-H FAIR POLICY

In accordance with State 4-H Fair Policy at the Southwest Washington Fair, the following statements must be adhered to by 4-H exhibitors.

- The use of illegal drugs and/or the improper use of animal health products Α. or foreign substances will not be tolerated in the WSU 4-H Youth Development Program. Extension personnel, 4-H volunteers, families, youth and fair/show officials have a legal and moral obligation not to misuse these products. We have the responsibility to tell others not to use these substances and to report those who do use any illegal substances. The administration of any drug or medication which could affect an animal's performance resulting in an unfair advantage or the disposition of the animal is unacceptable. Additionally, there are federal penalties for using illegal substances in animals that are going into the nation's food supply.
- All 4-H members who exhibit animal projects shall be responsible for the В. humane care and showmanship of their animal. Failure to comply may result in dismissal from the fair exhibit and forfeiture of all premiums.

ANIMAL EXHIBIT ENTRIES

PLEASE NOTE: "For Sale" signs are not to be displayed on any livestock exhibitor stall.

All exhibits must be entered using the Southwest Washington Fair online entry system (http://southwestwashingtonfair.org/exhibits/entries/4-hentries/). If any entry cannot be made via the online entry system, contact the department

superintendent for assistance. Bring a copy of your confirmation e-mail(s) on entry day.

- Β. Primary members may enter animals on a non-competitive level only if space is available. Limited to cats, poultry, cavies, rabbits, and pygmy novelty goats. No primary classes for dogs.
- С Exhibitors must enter and participate in a fitting and showing contest and are expected to enter the judging contest corresponding to their project. Horse - beef - dairy - goats - sheep - swine - dogs - cats - rabbits -
- D. cavies

These exhibitors must provide their own grain, hay or other feed and must also care for their animals. Shavings will be furnished and shall be the only bedding used in any Livestock Department. Exception: Sheep and goats may use straw furnished by the exhibitor. Bring only amount of hay needed for the day into the barn and tack areas.

- Ε. Exhibitor may not remain overnight unless accompanied by an adult or with special arrangements with the department head or fair management.
- F Any animal on exhibit may be used for the 4-H or FFA Judging Contest.
- G. Beef and dairy animals must be double-tied with an acceptable halter and neck rope. No animals may be tied with a show halter. Must have a lead rope on cattle to lead around barn area.
- All livestock must be inspected by the official fair veterinarian before н unloading or stalling. The veterinarian will have the final say on the animal's health, ability to be shown and fairgrounds livestock health requirements.
- The official fair veterinarian will be on the grounds at unloading area and I. livestock barns on entry day of the fair from 10:00 to 10 PM It is the veterinarian's duty to refuse admission to any animal showing evidence of communicable disease or not having a valid certificate as required. Classes may be divided at the discretion of the division superintendent.

Split Show – 4-H, FFA, Open Class Sheep and Dairy Goats

4-H sheep and dairy goats from Monday through Thursday. 4-H breeding sheep and goats will be released at 6:00 on Thursday. Market sheep and goats remain on the grounds until Sunday; however may be moved to different pens. 4-H and FFA animals entered also in open class may remain but will be asked to move their animals to a different pen and remove all 4-H paraphernalia.

Rules for Entering Exhibits in Open Class Departments - Beef, Dairy, Dairy Goats, Sheep,

- A. Exhibitors must meet Open Class entry requirements. Make certain the Department, Division and Class numbers as stated in Open Class Departments are used in making out Open Class Entry Forms.
- 4-H Livestock exhibitor's first and major show responsibility is to the В. respective 4-H departments and all animals so entered must be housed there except in hardship cases when a request to the respective department heads could receive approval.
- Exhibitors are responsible to check in their animals and registry papers with C. the Open Class department heads when and where requested.
- D Exhibits will be shown and judged as listed in the Open Class Departments and will receive premiums and awards from those departments.

4-H Department Entry Limitations

- Out of county exhibitors will be assigned an exhibitor # following receipt of their entry form by 4-H Office. A.
- Exhibitor must stay within the allowed number of entries. If the exhibitor B. enters more than the allowed number, the last exhibits to be judged will be disqualified.
- C. If more animal exhibits are allowed, club leaders will be notified prior to fair dates.
- D Stall or pen assignments are made on the basis of entries due July 18. Final stall and pen assignments are not made until 8:00 on haul in day, per species. Number of animals allowed may be further limited to allow Lewis County 4-H'ers to exhibit. Out-of-county 4-H exhibitors will be notified by August 1 of their acceptance or rejection.
- The JT Alexander barn stalls will be divided equally between 4-H beef and Ε. dairy exhibits.
- When Lewis County entries exceed species space limitation, the F. department superintendent will determine final stalling by reducing number of animals allowed by each exhibitor.

Judging Contest Rules

- Exhibitor number must be completed on contest registration card made out Α. at time of contest.
- в Participants must be enrolled in the project related to the contest.
- C. Judging must be on individual basis.
- D. Any entrant found conferring with anyone during the contest, except by permission of the superintendent, shall be disqualified. Any and all late cards will be disqualified.
- Ε. Scoring takes place as soon as possible following completion of the contest and scores will be posted.

- F. Each entrant is required to judge the classes as established by the contest superintendent.
- G. Written and/or oral reasons are required of at least one class in each contest.

- A. All exhibitors must participate.
- B. Competition will be on club basis and clubs must make out entry form by August 15 or premium will not be paid. See individual animal science divisions for specific classes and divisions.
- C. Each club's market sale animals will be judged along with breeding animals and grooming and/or chute areas.
- D. Failure of each exhibitor to cooperate and participate can result in forfeiture of premium points earned by exhibitor and/or removal of exhibit from the fairgrounds.
- E. Scores may be posted daily and there will be herdsmanship judges throughout the fair.

- I. Refer to each department for specific information on blanketing of fitting and showing animals.
- J. If two youth are on duty at the same time, one should stay with the animals at all times.
- K. Exhibitors should be dressed clean, neat and wear hard shoes. Be friendly and show courtesy to public.
- L. Empty water buckets only where directed. Keep faucet areas clear of debris and water puddles.
- M. See market sale rules for herdsmanship information regarding market animal sale.
- N. Members are excused while participating in the judging contest related to their project area or during show hours.
- Manure storage areas are provided.

 - Stall, pen or cage cards will be furnished for each animal and must be displayed.
 - 2. Club signs must be used.
 - 3. Greens, flowers or crepe paper may be used but must be fire proof.
 - Tack placed behind the walls in the space assigned and kept in good condition, clean and neat.
 - 5. Ribbons earned during the current fair only may be displayed.

- D. Divisions may be divided at the discretion of department superintendent.
 E. Boars not allowed.
- F. Questions for cavies will be taken from ASRBA and ACBA literature.
- G. Exhibitors must choose one premium class for fitting and showing in horse, dog, and goat divisions. Exhibitor must indicate on animal science entry form or horse entry form which fitting & showing class they select.
- H. All 4-H animals will be fit in their respective barns.

The purpose of the Southwest Washington Junior Livestock Sale is to provide an incentive for youth to exhibit and sell quality market stock which has reached marketable weight and grade. The exhibitor and the bidder and/or buyers are reminded that the price paid to the exhibitor may not, in fact, reflect a true market price at the time of the sale. It is the sponsor's desire that the buyers of animals featured in this sale will bid sufficiently to cover the individual exhibitors' additional expenses incurred in feeding and management of market animals. Animals sold at auction are suitable for slaughter at the time of the sale.

RULES AND REGULATIONS ELIGIBILITY:

- 4-H members must be enrolled as a 4-H member in a Market Animal project by April 1st to be eligible to participate. FFA members must be a member of an FFA Chapter and actively carrying the Market Animal 1. project as their SAE farming project.
- A "Memorandum of Understanding" must be COMPLETED AND 2. TURNED IN TO THE COMMITTEE WITH SPECIES INTENT TO SELL, EACH YEAR OF PARTICIPATION. NO EXCEPTIONS
- 3. Use of illegal drugs and /or the improper use of animal health products or foreign substances will not be tolerated in the Washington State 4-H Youth Development/FFA programs. Extension personnel, FFA advisors, FFA/4-H volunteers, families, youth, and fair/show officials have a legal and moral obligation not to misuse these products. We have the responsibility to tell others not to use these substances and to report those who do. The administration of any drug or medication which could affect an animal's performance resulting in an unfair advantage or the disposition of the animal is unacceptable. Additionally, there are federal penalties for using illegal substances in animals that are going into the nation's food supply. Sale management reserves the right to test any market animal that will be processed. If a test is positive for illegal substance at any time, the matter is turned over to the appropriate legal authorities as it is a federal offense.
- Should any animal behave in a manner that may cause injury to 4. participant or handler, the animal will be disqualified from the sale, caged in a holding area and removed from the fairgrounds in such a manner that possible injury to bystanders and/or handler will be minimal. This also includes pre-fair activities.
- 5. Exhibitor may weigh two (2) animals or pens (pens- consisting of 3 animals each for rabbits and 4 animals for fryers) if needed. If the first pre-tagged animal/pen does not make weight, then they may weigh a second pre-tagged animal/pen. If the first makes weight, there will not be a second weighing

HOG HAUL IN SUNDAY 9:00 AM TO 7:00 PM (vet check from 4:00 -7:00 PM), Monday-BEEF and DAIRY HEIFERS by 12 noon, SHEEP and GOATS by 3:00 PM, POULTRY COOPED-IN by 6:00 PM, and RABBITS by 5:00 – 7:00 PM ON MONDAY. HOG WEIGH IN TO BE ON MONDAY AT 9:00 AM WITH THE ULTRASOUND TO FOLLOW.

SCALES WILL BE OPEN FOR BEEF and DAIRY HEIFERS FROM 1 -2 PM MONDAY, LAMBS TO FOLLOW BEEF AND GOATS TO FOLLOW SHEEP. BEEF ULTRASOUND ALSO FOLLOWS THEIR WEIGH IN. POULTRY WEIGH IN WILL BE FROM 7:00 - 8:00 PM. RABBIT WEIGH IN WILL BE ON MONDAY, 4-H AT 6 PM AND FFA AT 7 PM.

- 6. Exhibitor must be present to bring their animal/pen to the scales during final weigh-in between posted times on Monday or Tuesday, see above. This weight will be the sale weight, with the exception of the shrink percentage applied during the auction. A Representative from the Sale Committee will inspect all animals entered in the sale during final weighin. If the animal does not meet weight minimum or maximum limits, the animal will be eliminated from the sale. Exhibitor may change their entry to the appropriate department, division, and class not associated with the Southwest Washington Junior Livestock Sale.
- 7. Steers and Dairy Heifers must be naturally polled or dehorned. Sheep entered in market and showmanship divisions must be polled or dehorned. Horned, non-dairy goats may be exhibited in 4-H showmanship divisions where animals are not exchanged between youth in the show ring. For a horned animal to be exhibited it must have its horn tips covered. If the non-dairy goat has scurs (horn re-growth), these scurs cannot exceed 1" in length without the horn tips being covered. Non-dairy horned goats may be shown in market and breeding classes but they must have horn tips covered as a safety precaution. There will be NO horned dairy goats.
- 8. Market Beef must be steers, market dairy heifers must be heifers and may be registered or grade but must be one of the six main dairy breeds (no cross breeds), market lambs may be ewes or wethers, market goats may be doelings or wethers, market hogs may be gilts or barrows, rabbits and poultry (fryer, geese, ducks, or turkeys) may be either sex; however, should be uniform in size, weight, and sex.
- 9. Market lambs and goats must be slick shorn within one week of the show and sale.
- 10. No animal previously sold at any 4-H or FFA Youth Sale shall be resold at the Southwest Washington Junior Livestock Sale.
- 11. The following minimum and maximum weights and grades will be utilized for this sale:

Market Steers: Min 1050 lbs. - Max. 1,550 lbs.

Must grade at least SELECT to qualify for sale. Desirable age of steers should be between 14-20 months. See #6 above.

Market Dairy Heifers: Min. bred 120 days - 8 months bred max., must have 840 RFID tag/number, will be weighed for sale weight, and manually preg. checked at final weigh-in by veterinarian.

Market Lambs: Min. 95 lbs. - Max. 160 lbs.

Must grade at least SELECT to gualify for sale and slick shorn within one week of the show. Desirable age of lambs should be 4-7 months.

Market Hogs: Min. 225 lbs. - 300 lbs. Must grade at least USDA #2 to qualify for sale. Desirable age of hogs

should be 5-6 months.

Market Goats: Min. 70 lbs. – Max. 130 lbs. Must be ¾ or higher Boer, Kiko, or Savanna(h), grade USDA Prime or Choice, and be slick shorn within one week of the show. Desirable age of goats should be 4-8 months. Not older than December 1st. Market Poultry:

Fryers: Pen of 4 to weigh in (must have a min. of 3 to sell on Friday), Min. 5 lbs. / each - Max. 8.5 lbs. / each. Desirable age of fryers is between 6-8 weeks. Hatch date should be sometime the first full week of July (may need to plan ahead for this hatch date and order 21 days in advance, check with your chick supplier). Cornish Cross (Cornish X) are recommended for the fryer project.

Turkeys: One animal, Min. 15 lbs. - Max. 35 lbs. Desirable age of hens is about 14 weeks and toms 18 weeks. Hatch date should be sometime between April 10 - May 10.

Market Geese: One Animal, Min. 10 lbs. – Max 18 lbs. Desirable age of geese and ganders is 6 – 9 months of age. Hatch date should be between Mid-November and Mid-February. Must be medium or heavy breed.

Market Ducks: Pen of 3 Animals, Min. 5.5 lbs. - Max 8.5 lbs. Desirable age is 8-11 weeks. Hatch date should be sometime the 1st half of June; plan ahead for hatch dates and shipping with your supplier, as with fryers. Breed is Commercial/Jumbo/ Hybrid (all the same cross) Pekin.

Market Rabbits: Pen of 3, Min. 4 lbs. / each - Max. 6.5 lbs. / each. Desirable age of frver rabbits is between 8-12 weeks, but not to exceed 14 weeks. Kindle date not before May 1st.

ENTRY REGULATIONS

- 1. Each exhibitor may enter one small pen (poultry or rabbit) and one large animal. For purposes of pre-tagging and pre-weigh-ins, an exhibitor may pre-weigh up to **TWO (2)** animals/pens; any animal/pen can be traded prior to going on scale. Their **SALE AMIMAL OR PEN** must be selected prior to going on scale. Their SALE Animal OK FLITING to selected prior to going across the scale. Family members residing in the same home may tag up to two (2) animals/pens each. - 5. Exhibitors and/or others may not buy animals for specific return of animal/pen to the exhibitor or to be shown at other shows and/or sales by any exhibitor.

SALE REGULATIONS

- 1. The official judge may exclude the exhibit from the sale if it fails to meet the minimum grade. Animals/pens sold at the auction will include only blue and red ribbon animals/pens. White ribbon animals/pens will NOT be allowed in the auction sale.
- 2. A shrink percentage will be utilized as follows: Steers and Dairy Heifers - 3%, Lambs, goats, and Hogs - 2%.
- 3. Exhibitors must be present to bring their animal/pen into the auction ring or it will not sell. No proxies allowed.
- All large animals: Beef, Dairy Heifers, Sheep, Goats, and Swine will be sold by the pound. All small animals: Rabbits and Poultry will be sold by the pen or individually (turkeys). All sales are final.
- 5. Sale order is determined by Sale Committee. The following species order will be used for 2021: TURKEY, POULTRY, STEERS, DAIRY, RABBITS, LAMBS, GOATS, and HOGS. 4-H exhibitors sell first on even years and FFA exhibitors sell first on odd years.
- Exhibitors of steers and dairy heifers must complete a bill of sale available at the 4-H Livestock Office on the fairgrounds. 6.
- 7. If dairy heifers are registered, registration papers will accompany animals/sale paperwork.
- NO advertising allowed on any female animal, except dairy heifers, 8. regarding animal's eligibility for registration or pedigree indicating its use as a breeding animal.

PAYMENTS FROM SALE

1. A fee of up to 4% of the gross sale will be deducted from the sale on each animal/pen. Each species that has a state or national check off or promotional program (beef, swine, and sheep) will also have those monies deducted from the gross sale of the animal as indicated by each program. No deduction will be made from any of the add-ons for any animal/pen.

- 2. Proceeds of the sale will be distributed to exhibitors after payment has exhibitors until all proceeds of the sale have been received by the sale treasurer. Proceeds of the sale will be distributed as follows: 4-H will be mailed or delivered by club and to FFA Advisors for pick-up by families.
- 3. Payments to youth are generally sent out 60 plus days after the sale.

EXHIBITORS RESPONSIBILITIES

- 1. Each exhibitor assumes the responsibility for securing at least three potential buyers. Exhibitors are encouraged to provide proof of three buyer contacts such as copies of letters to prospective buyers, and turn them into the 4-H Livestock Office on the fairgrounds.
- 2. Exhibitors of steers and dairy heifers must provide buyer with a rope halter which may or may not be returned to exhibitor. Buyers of small animals/pens must provide a transport cage.
- 3. Animals/pens may be grouped together. Exhibitor is responsible for care, feeding, watering and herdsmanship during the entire duration of the fair, regardless of when exhibitor's animal/pen leaves the fairgrounds.
- Each exhibitor is asked to come with a 5" x 7" photo of the exhibitor and 4. their project, this will be given to the buyer of the project.
- 5. Each exhibitor must submit a producer affidavit health record at weigh-in.

BUYER'S AND THOSE WHO PROVIDE ADD-ONS RESPONSIBILITY

- All buyers and add-on providers will be billed following the sale and are 1. expected to pay by check sent to the Clerk of the Market Sale at: SWJLS, P.O. Box 1635, Chehalis, WA 98532. Buyers and add-on providers may pay the night of the sale at the Treasurers table.
- Buyer is not to purchase animal/pen for specific return of animal/pen to 2. exhibitor or to show at other shows/sales by any exhibitors.

Read Animal Science division regulations and requirements for all animals and split show, including Judging Contest, Herdsmanship, Fitting and

- Showing, Contest Regulations, ribbon awards and bowls. 4-H Leaders and/or exhibitors that have changes to animal numbers (lower Β. numbers only, no extra goats will be allowed past the July 18th deadline) must call the Superintendent by August 10th, pen space is limited. All goats of one exhibitor or family will be penned together as space allows. ONLY ONE ENTRY PER CLASS 1-8. TWO ENTRIES CLASS 11-87 AS SPACE ALLOWS.
- Fitting and showing is not an option. An exhibitor must compete in C. fitting and showing class to be eligible for any type class. Each exhibitor will be able to show for premiums in only ONE of the following Fitting and Showing classes: Dairy Goats, Pygmy Goats, Fleece Goats, Meat Goats, Pack Goats or Cart Goats. Make sure your club enters
- posters! One poster per project. Primary 4-H members (K-2nd grade) may exhibit on a non-competitive, non-D. premium basis with Pygmy goats, Nigerian, or a goat kid (goat kid born current year). Primary exhibitors allowed as space provides. Primary class
- time will be at Judge's discretion. Meat goats entered in the Market Sale must be at least ¾ Boer and above. Ε. No dairy animals or pygmy goats allowed in the meat goat classes.
- F All market goats will be weighed Monday of haul-in. Lambs will start at 3:00 and goats will follow. Exhibitors of goats must be present to bring their own animal to the scale. All market goats must be on the grounds by 3:00. Exhibitors Meeting to follow weigh-in.
- G. Exhibitors that are competing with market animals should also enter their animal through the Southwest Washington Junior Livestock Sale Division 017
- Horned, non-dairy goats may be exhibited in 4-H showmanship classes H. where animals are not exchanged between youth in the show ring. For a horned animal to be exhibited it must have its horn tips covered. If the nondairy goat has scurs (horn re-growth), these scurs cannot exceed 1" in length without the horn tips being covered. Non-dairy horned goats may be shown in market and breeding classes but they must have horn tips covered as a safety precaution. There will be NO horned dairy goats.
- There will be NO intact or just banded males permitted in the barn. ١. No borrowing of animals will be allowed for group classes accept where J. club entries are allowed.
- All animals must be fed and watered on a regular basis and as needed on K. hot days. Water buckets will be kept full and clean. Hay fed in appropriate feeders and kept filled for display. All pens will be kept clean and free from visible debris.
- No animals will be left unattended at wash rack or show ring.
- All animals in lactation must be milked a minimum of 2X per day on a Μ. regular schedule. The exceptions being a nursing Doe or on show day when animals may be bagged for show and milked out appropriately.
- N. ALL EXHIBITORS MUST PARTICIPATE IN HERDSMANDSHIP. Herdsman must be dressed neatly, wear close toed shoes, and have identifying badge, vest, shirt, hat etc. to show club affiliation while on duty. When it is exhibitors assigned herds' time they will be in the barn on time from the beginning of their shift until the end; you may not leave your station or the barn. If this rule is not followed it can result in the loss of premiums and could extend to the entire club's loss of herdsmanship premiums.
- О. No exhibitor on herds will be in the barn alone while on herds. There will be one adult from the 4-H club in the barn to supervise the Herdsman. No child under the age of 14 is to be left alone in the barns whether they are on herds or not.
- When on herds, exhibitors will behave in a mannerly fashion, no horsing Р around. Exhibitors will keep the barn isle-ways swept clean and free from any visible debris or manure. Exhibitors will keep the tack/stall area organized and clean from garbage and manure. If this rule is not followed it can mean the loss of premiums for the exhibitors club.
- Q. Exhibitors may assist each other in fitting and clipping of animals of all type classes (Parents may help at Superintendents discretion). Hiring or having someone else fitting the animal can result in disqualification from fair and premiums forfeited. Animals used for fitting and showing must be clipped or fitted by the exhibitor. In type classes where exhibitors have more than one entry, other 4-H exhibitors may assist them in the show ring.
- The superintendent reserves the right to dismiss any exhibitor from any 4-H R. class for any misconduct or infraction of the Southwest Washington Fair Rules. The superintendent and 4-H Agent will make final decisions on forfeiture of awards and premiums from class dismissal and/or dismissal from the fair.

If you are not bringing your pre-entered pet, please report this to the Superintendent so your space may be filled.
- 2. Two entries per class, based on space available.
- Cages and decorations must be in place by Mon. prior to the opening of the fair between 2 and 9 PM. Contact the Pocket Pet Superintendent for housing issues prior to the fair.
- All animals will be in place by 9AM on Tuesday, opening day of the fair. Pocket Pets will be released from 6 to 7:00 Sunday evening (last day) and 3 to 7:00 Monday following the fair (please prearrange).
- Exhibitors will provide their own escape-proof cages, aquariums, or containers for animals being exhibited and approved at time of entry by the superintendent.

- Breeders Class: Each exhibitor is limited to 1 entry per class (division J number). This animal must be produced in the exhibitor's barn, by the exhibitor's own breeding within the last 4-H year. The exhibitor must be dressed in Fitting & Showing attire as they present their animal to the judge, as well as a completed pedigree done the day before in front of the superintendent. The exhibitor may be asked questions about their breeding program.
- All animals exhibited must make minimum weight for their breed to show. K. The only exception to this rule will be the single fryer and fryer pen entries.
- Rabbits may be rejected because of insects or disease. Μ. All Exhibitors must enter Fitting and Showing with an animal also entered in Type.
- Exhibitors may bring feeders and waterers from home; however, all feeders N. and waterers must be clean and in good repair. All feeders and waterers

- Photocopies on plain paper are not acceptable. Must be printed on photo H. quality paper.
- Digital photography may be used in photo story, photo albums and I. photojournalism; however, they must be all digital or all film.

- J. Prints in Classes 14 - 21, 23, 25, and 29 must be either all film or all digital. Prints should be mounted on a poster (display) board that is as small as possible, yet tastefully done with appropriate margins.
- Damaged prints may have been taken by another person, and can be either vintage or recent. Exhibitor should scan the item and then restore the print using various techniques. Judging will be done according to how well the photo is restored. All finished prints must be no smaller than 5" X к 7" or larger than 8x10. Entry is to include the restored print, a 3x5 typed card explaining the techniques used, and an untouched copy of the original print. Display boards are to measure no larger than 14" x 22'
- L. Promotional photos must have releases and may be used in 4-H or Southwest Washington Fair promotional materials.
- M. Computer Generated Photography Requirements:

*Definition of computer generated photos: Images taken with standard camera with standard film, then scanned, digitized and manipulated, or images captured with digital camera then manipulated.

- 1) All finished pictures must be no smaller than 5" x 7", no larger than 8" x 10".
- Black/white photos must be done with the gray scale. Color photos 2) must be done with RGB or CMYK scale.
- 3) All exhibits must be printed on photographic paper; no copy paper exhibits will be accepted.
- 4) It is recommended that digital captures be taken on "high" resolution.
- Digital captures <u>must</u> be color corrected. 5) All Images can be sandwiched/cut & paste; retouched/cloned; filters or any other special effects used. 6)
- Minimum printer output of 300 DPI or PPI should be used. 7)
- Original image must be part of the mounted display, on the front of 8) the exhibit mat for comparison.
- 9) A 3x5 card must be part of the mounted display, explaining what was done to arrive at the final image. 4-H Photography label C0890 must be attached as instructed on the label, and filled out correctly. The original image, finished picture, and index card should be mounted tastefully on a poster (display) board no larger than 14" x 22.
- N. Judging Contest Rules:
 - Exhibitor number must be completed on contest registration card 1) made out at time of contest.
 - Participants must be enrolled in the project related to the contest. 2) Judging must be on individual basis. 3)
 - Any entrant found conferring with anyone during the contest, except 4) by permission of the superintendent, shall be disqualified. Any and all late cards will be disqualified.
 - 5) Scoring takes place as soon as possible following completion of the contest and scores will be posted.
 - Each entrant is required to judge the classes as established by the 6) contest superintendent.



A QUICK GUIDE FOR FIRST TIME EXHIBITORS

Q: Who can enter exhibits?

A: Anyone may enter exhibits in the fair. Check each department listing for details specific for that department. Some departments are limited due to space and staffing.

Q: What does it cost to enter?

A: Entry fees vary by department; see complete listing of ENTRY FEES listed below. Check each department listing for entry times. Fees are paid at the time of online entry using the Southwest Washington Fair online registration system (http://southwestwashingtonfair.org/exhibits/entries/open-class-entries/).

Q: Can I enter exhibits in more than one department?

A: An individual item can only be entered in one department and most departments limit the number of entries from any one individual. Individuals are not, however, limited to the number of departments in which they may submit entries.

Q: How far in advance must I enter an exhibit?

A: Deadlines vary for individual departments. Although livestock deadlines are throughout the summer, most non-livestock exhibit deadlines are one to seven days before the start of the fair. Refer to individual department listings. Entries are made using the Southwest Washington Fair online registration system http://southwestwashingtonfair.org/exhibits/entries/.

Q: What types of prizes/awards can I win?

A: The types of awards/prizes vary by department. Although some departments give nominal cash premiums and trophies, all departments award ribbons.

Q: How are the exhibits judged?

A: Exhibits are judged on their appearance, quality, color, and all other attributes normally associated with this type of exhibit. The judging is done by experienced judges, who are specialized in that particular field.

Q: Whom do I call if I have questions?

A: Most department listings include the name and telephone number of the Superintendent involved in that department. They would be happy to answer your questions. If you are unable to reach them, call the Southwest Washington Fair Office at 360-740-1495.

Q: What do I do when I bring my exhibit to the fairgrounds?

A: All exhibits should be taken to the appropriate building; at that point you will receive help from the "Department Superintendent". All buildings will be visibly marked. Prior to entry day, complete your entries using the Southwest Washington Fair online registration system

(http://southwestwashingtonfair.org/exhibits/entries/). Please bring a copy of your confirmation e-mail with you on entry day.

Q: I would like to volunteer at the fair, who do I contact?

A: It takes hundreds of volunteers to put on a fair every year. Whether you have a specific area of interest or just want to help out any way that you can, call the Southwest Washington Fair Office at 360-740-1495. We will be delighted to match you with one of the areas for which we need help.

GENERAL RULES

The Southwest Washington Fair is the official Fair of Lewis County. It is the objective of the Fair to provide quality competition, and a diversified program. The Southwest Washington Fair encourages participation of competitive exhibits; however, when limitations of space, facilities, and time occur, priorities will be set according to: 1. Area residency, 2. Previous participation, 3. Quality and diversity

of exhibit. The management reserves the final and absolute right to alter, interpret, or change the rules and regulations as may become necessary; also to determine all matters, questions, and differences that may arise in or out of an incident at the Fair without notification to the public. Management also reserves the right to remove any exhibitor not complying with Fair rules and policy.

NOTE: If you need special assistance with entering your projects please call the Fair Office at 360-740-1495.

COMMERCIAL VENDORS

All commercial space is assigned by contract through the Fair Office. Contracts specify exact rules, regulations, and payment deadlines. Commercial application packets are available online at https://southwestwashingtonfair.org/get-involved/vendors/ or from the Fair Office.

LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS

Show rules and operations are established by each department. Fair management reminds animal exhibitors good showmanship includes public education, cooperation, and herdsmanship. The Fair's minimum health requirements are the same as the recommended minimum health requirements by the State Veterinarian. The Fair Veterinarian will have the final say on the animal's health, ability to be shown, and fairgrounds livestock health requirements.

NOTE: As of 2018, the Department of Agriculture no longer issues fairs a blanket permit for out-of-state exhibitor's use. As an out-of-state exhibitor, you or your veterinarian need to contact the Department of Agriculture for any permit number used on the certificate of veterinary inspections. - A. Identification of animals, breeds, farm, etc. is good for all.
- B. Cooperation with other exhibitors and superintendent.
- C. Good herdsmanship creates a pleasant, safe area to view. Public hours are 10 AM to 10 PM Tuesday through Thursday, 10 AM to 11 PM Friday & Saturday, and 10 AM to 7 PM Sunday.
- Saturday, and 10 AM to 7 PM Sunday.
 D. Honesty and fairness are a part of showmanship. Misrepresentation of ownership, animals, or other acts to discredit or give an advantage may result in forfeiture of entry fees, prizes, and premiums or expulsion from the Southwest Washington Fair.
- E. Because of crowded conditions and public viewing of animals, only animals being shown are allowed on the fairgrounds.
- F. The use of alcohol on the Fairgrounds is prohibited. Its use may result in forfeiture of all premiums and future exhibitor status.
- G. No dogs allowed in the barns.
- H. Entry deadlines will be strictly adhered to. No late entries will be accepted.
- No selling of animals allowed during the Fair unless prior arrangements have been made, i.e. commercial space. <u>NO "FOR SALE"</u> signs allowed on pens, stalls, or coops, etc.

- Entry fees must be paid in the Southwest Washington Fair online entry 1. system. http://southwestwashingtonfair.org/exhibits/entries.
- Withdrawal of exhibit after entry fees have been paid will result in loss of 2 entry fees.
- Entry fees will only be refunded to animal exhibits with a signed statement 3. from a veterinarian, prior to the Fair, that the animal will pose a health threat to other animals in the barn. Refunds will be mailed after the Fair.
- 4 Disqualification from Fair Veterinarian will result in forfeiting entry fees.

PREMIUMS

The Southwest Washington Fair will utilize a premium point system for open class, 4-H, and FFA. The amount listed after the prizes are the points awarded to that ribbon. Some departments are paid in straight point value. The total premium points are divided into the premium dollars available to determine the pay-out per point. Over the past 10 years, pay-out has been between \$0.09 and \$0.24 per point. Premium checks will not be issued for premium winnings that are \$2.00 and under.

EXHIBITOR NUMBER

Exhibitor numbers will be assigned by the Southwest Washington Fair online entry system.

EXHIBITOR ADMISSION AND PARKING TICKETS (OPEN CLASS ONLY)

- Exhibitor admission tickets and parking tickets are available only to 1. individuals who have to work with their exhibits during the Fair or are required by the Fair to be on the grounds. Exhibitor tickets are not available to individuals who have static exhibits at the fair such as Hobbies & Crafts, Home Arts, Jr. and Sr. Art, Photography, Agriculture, Baled Hay, and Grange.
- Three one-day exhibitor admission tickets will be provided to each open 2 class livestock exhibitor at no charge. Additional tickets may be purchased depending on the number of livestock entries. Discount exhibitor tickets are available for the exhibitor only. Admission and parking tickets are on sale at the Fair Office beginning July 18th. Admission and parking tickets can also be purchased at the Guest Services booth beginning the weekend before Fair.
- Exhibitor admission tickets cannot be purchased at the Fair gates. You must 3. have a ticket with you to pass through the gate or pay regular Fair admission.
- Exhibitor parking passes are sold on a season basis or semi-seasonal basis 4. only. One livestock parking pass per household is available to each exhibitor at no charge. This parking pass is only accepted in the livestock parking area. Additional livestock parking passes can be purchased.

EXHIBITOR ADMISSION TICKETS (4-H AND FFA ONLY)

- 4-H and FFA exhibitor tickets are available to youth involved in those 1. programs and who place exhibits at the Fair.
- 4-H and FFA tickets are available to 4-H and FFA exhibitors starting the 2. weekend before the Fair at the Guest Services Booth. You must have a signed authorization slip in order to purchase tickets.
- You cannot purchase exhibitor tickets at the gate. You must have your 3. exhibitor ticket with you to pass through the gate or pay regular Fair admission.
- 4. 4-H and FFA Exhibitor tickets are available at \$2.00 per exhibitor per day. 4-H and FFA parents pay \$5.00 per person per day.
- There are no refunds or exchanges on any tickets. 5
- The Guest Services Booth will begin selling 4-H and FFA tickets the weekend before fair daily from 10 AM to 5 PM.

CAMPING

Southwest Washington Fair has three campgrounds available for camping: Bridle Acres, located at the west side of the fairgrounds along the railroad tracks, Fair Meadows, located at the north end of the fairgrounds behind the Horse Arena, and Oak Grove, which is at the south end of the fairgrounds. These are the only three locations where overnight camping is allowed.

Reservations and Fees

Camping Cancellations

A \$30.00 handling fee is charged on all refunds. If a paid space is cancelled prior to June 28^h, a refund may be obtained, minus the \$30.00 handling fee. We are sorry, but we are unable to refund any fees if a space is cancelled after June 28th. Refunds will be mailed within 30 days of the day of cancellation.

Camping Regulations

We provide space for one camping vehicle and one motor vehicle per campsite. Camping may begin Saturday prior to the Fair. Please park your camping vehicle in the corresponding space. We ask that you not allow anyone else to camp in your campsite. In order for us to properly patrol and protect our guests, it is important we be aware of who is in each location. If you must cancel, please notify the Fair Office.

Remember to be considerate of your neighbors while camping at the Fair. Please keep your volume down especially in the night and morning hours. The camping areas are patrolled by security and security will report any problems to the Fair Manager. A warning will be issued in this case and camping privileges may be revoked if problems persist. Camping fees are non-refundable under these circumstances.

Water/Electric/Sewage Information

Please Do Not run electrical cords or water hoses beyond your campsite. For the safety of all persons using our campgrounds this policy must be adhered to or camping privileges may be revoked.

The Southwest Washington Fair asks you refrain from excessive power and air conditioning use during your stay with us due to our limited electrical capacity in our camping areas. *Thank you for your cooperation.*

We have no dumping facilities on site. For the health and safety of our guests, we do not allow dumping of any kind of waste onto the ground. There are local portable waste pumping services available for your convenience.
