2025 SOUTHWEST WASHINGTON FAIR EXHIBITOR'S HANDBOOK

The Exhibitor's Handbook is the official operational standard of the Southwest Washington Fair and can be found on our website at: http://southwestwashingtonfair.org/exhibits/entries/. Listed within are: contact information for superintendents, conditions of exhibits, identification of responsible persons, general fair rules and policy, exhibit requirements, listing of awards and prizes, and deadlines.

A QUICK GUIDE FOR FIRST TIME EXHIBITORS

Q: Who can enter exhibits?

A: Anyone may enter exhibits in the fair. There are no age or residency restrictions. You simply need to physically enter your exhibit(s) on your entry day(s) and pick up exhibit(s) on the release day. Check each department listing for details specific for that department. Please note that some departments are limited due to space and staffing.

Q: How am I assigned an exhibitor number?

A: Once you register in the online registration system, you will be auto-assigned an exhibitor number. It is important you record this information in a safe place. You <u>never</u> want to create a secondary registration (thereby receiving a second exhibitor number) since this will impact your ability to accumulate and qualify for premium payouts.

Q: What does it cost to enter?

A: Entry fees vary by department; see complete listing of **ENTRY FEES** listed on the previous page or within each department's section of this Handbook. Check each department listing for entry times. Fees are paid at the time of online entry using the Southwest Washington Fair online registration system (http://southwestwashingtonfair.org/exhibits/entries/open-class-entries/).

Q: Can I enter exhibits in more than one department?

A: An individual item can only be entered in one department and most departments limit the number of entries from any one individual. Individuals are not, however, limited to the number of departments in which they may submit entries.

Q: How far in advance must I enter an exhibit?

A: Deadlines vary for individual departments. Although livestock deadlines are throughout the summer, most non-livestock exhibit deadlines are one to seven days before the start of the fair. Refer to individual department listings.

Q: What types of prizes/awards can I win?

A: The types of awards/prizes vary by department. Although some departments give nominal cash premiums and trophies, all departments award ribbons.

Q: How are the exhibits judged?

A: Exhibits are judged on their appearance, quality, color, and all other attributes normally associated with this type of exhibit. The judging is done by experienced judges, who are specialized in that particular field.

Q: Whom do I call if I have questions?

A: Most department listings include the name and telephone number of the Superintendent involved in that department. They would be happy to answer your questions. If you are unable to reach them, call the Southwest Washington Fair Office at 360-740-1495.

Q: What do I do when I bring my exhibit to the fairgrounds?

A: All exhibits should be taken to the appropriate building; at that point you will receive help from the "Department Superintendent". All buildings will be visibly marked. Prior to entry day, complete your entries using the Southwest Washington Fair online registration system (http://southwestwashingtonfair.org/exhibits/entries/). Please bring a copy of your confirmation e-mail with you on entry day.

Q: I would like to volunteer at the fair, who do I contact?

A: It takes hundreds of volunteers to put on a fair every year! Whether you have a specific area of interest or just want to help out any way that you can, call the Southwest Washington Fair Office at 360-740-1495. We will be delighted to match you with one of the areas in which we need help.

GENERAL RULES

The Southwest Washington Fair is "the official county and district fair and agricultural fair" (RCW 36.90.040). It is the objective of the Fair to provide quality competition, and a diversified program. The Southwest Washington Fair encourages participation of competitive exhibits; however, when limitations of space, facilities, and time occur, priorities will be set according to: 1. Area residency, 2. Previous participation, 3. Quality and diversity of exhibit. The management reserves the final and absolute right to alter, interpret, or change the rules and regulations as may become necessary; also to determine all matters, questions, and differences that may arise in or out of an incident at the Fair without notification to the public. Management also reserves the right to remove any exhibitor not complying with Fair rules and policy. Exhibitors must follow direction from their Superintendent and Fair Management. NOTE: If you need special assistance with entering your projects please call the Fair Office at 360-740-1495.

CAMPING

Southwest Washington Fair has three campgrounds available for camping: **Bridle Acres**, located at the west side of the fairgrounds along the railroad tracks, **Fair Meadows**, located at the north end of the fairgrounds behind the Horse Arena, and **Oak Grove**, which is at the south end of the

fairgrounds. These are the only three locations where overnight camping is allowed. Reservations can be made by using the online booking system Rover Pass. https://southwestwashingtonfair.org/general-info/camping/

NOTE: If you need special assistance with entering at the Fair or have questions regarding our facility, please call the Fair Office at 360-740-1495.

LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS

Show rules and operations are established by each department. Fair management reminds animal exhibitors good showmanship includes public education, cooperation, and herdsmanship. The Fair's minimum health requirements are the same as the recommended minimum health requirements by the State Veterinarian. The Fair Veterinarian will have the final say on the animal's health, ability to be shown, and fairgrounds livestock health requirements.

NOTE: As of 2019, the Department of Agriculture no longer issues fairs a blanket permit for out-of-state exhibitor's use. As an out-of-state exhibitor, you or your veterinarian need to contact the Department of Agriculture for any permit number used on the certificate of veterinary inspections. Per Department of Agriculture call 360-902-1878 M-F 8-5, after hours and weekends call 1-800-942-1035 or go to their web page at http://fortress/agr/gov/apps/EntryPermits/

- A. Identification of animals, breeds, farm, etc. is good for all.
- B. Cooperation with other exhibitors and superintendent.
- C. Good herdsmanship creates a pleasant, safe area to view. Public hours are 10 AM to 10 PM Tuesday through Thursday, 10 AM to 11 PM Friday & Saturday, and 10 AM to 7 PM Sunday.
- D. Honesty and fairness are a part of showmanship. Misrepresentation of ownership, animals, or other acts to discredit or give an advantage may result in forfeiture of entry fees, prizes, and premiums or expulsion from the Southwest Washington Fair.
- E. Because of crowded conditions and public viewing of animals, only animals being shown are allowed on the fairgrounds.
- F. The use of alcohol on the Fairgrounds is prohibited. Its use may result in forfeiture of all premiums and future exhibitor status.
- G. No dogs allowed in the barns.
- H. Entry deadlines will be strictly adhered to. No late entries will be accepted.
- No selling of animals allowed during the Fair unless prior arrangements have been made, i.e. commercial space. NO "FOR SALE" signs allowed on pens, stalls, or coops, etc.

PREMIUMS

The Southwest Washington Fair utilizes a premium point system for Open Class, 4-H, and FFA. The amount listed after the prizes are the points awarded to that ribbon; some departments pay straight premium dollar amounts based on results. The total premium points are divided into the premium dollars available to determine the pay-out per point. Over the past 10 years, pay-out has been between \$0.09 and \$0.27 per point. Premium checks will not be issued for premium winnings that are \$2.00 or less.

NOTE: CHECKS MUST BE CASHED PRIOR TO NOV. 30, 2025.

Uncashed premium checks will be considered a donation to the Fair as of December 1st of the year awarded.

EXHIBITOR ADMISSION AND PARKING TICKETS

(OPEN CLASS ONLY)

- A one-day exhibitor admission ticket will be provided by the Department Superintendent to each open class animal exhibitor at no charge for each day their animal is on exhibition. A separate adult ticket may be purchased for youth exhibitors to have an adult chaperone for each day. Each livestock exhibitor will receive one parking pass for their trailer and towing vehicle. Discount exhibitor tickets are available for the exhibitor only and must be purchased at Guest Services or in the Fair Office. Admission and parking tickets are on sale at the Fair Office beginning August 1st through the day before Fair.
 Admission, parking tickets and livestock parking permits can also be purchased at the Guest Services booth beginning the Thursday before Fair.
- 2. Individuals who have static, or still life, exhibits at the fair such as Hobbies & Crafts, Home Arts, Jr. and Sr. Art, Photography, Agriculture, Baled Hay, and Grange will receive **one** single-day admission ticket from the department Superintendent at the time of exhibit entry. Extra exhibitor tickets are available for the <u>exhibitor only</u> at a discounted price and must be purchased at Guest Services or in the Fair Office.
- 4. Exhibitor parking passes are sold in advance only at Guest Services. One livestock parking pass **per household** is available to each livestock exhibitor at no charge. This parking pass is only accepted in the livestock parking area. Additional livestock parking passes can be purchased.
- 5. No refunds or exchanges on tickets or passes.

All exhibits <u>and</u> your online entry receipt must be brought to the Community Events Building on Tuesday, August 5th between 4 PM and 8 PM or Wednesday, August 6th between 10 AM and 2 PM.

GENERAL RULES

- For faster service, complete your online registration prior to midnight on Monday, August 5th. Entry tags will be preprinted and available when you arrive on Entry Day. Please bring a copy of your confirmation e-mail(s) on entry day.
- 2. If you are unable to enter online by August 5th, registration forms and entry tags will be provided but not preprinted.
- 3. CLEARLY MARK ENTRY TAG IF YOU ARE YOUTH (17 & UNDER) OR ADULT (18 & OVER) using the Description field in the online registration system.
- 4. VERIFY EACH DEPARTMENT FOR EXHIBIT ENTRY LIMITS.
- Exhibits will be judged by the Danish method, according to the standards of blue, red, and white ribbon classes. Only blue and red ribbon classes will receive points toward cash awards.
- 6. All exhibits must be entered using the Southwest Washington Fair online registration system:
 - (http://southwestwashingtonfair.org/exhibits/entries/open-class-entries/). If any entry cannot be made via the online registration system, contact the department superintendent or the Southwest Washington Fair office for assistance. Bring a copy of your confirmation e-mail(s) on entry day. No late entries.
- 7. Checkout time is 7:30 PM 9:00 PM Sunday or 9:00 AM Noon Monday after the Fair.
- No entry fee will be charged and no admission ticket will be given to any exhibitor.
- 9. Any article exhibited should not have been exhibited before at the Southwest Washington Fair. Exhibits must be entered in the name of the maker and made within the last 3 years, except canning which must be processed since last year's fair.
- 10. Special awards and Best in Division will be judges' choice.

- 11. Exhibits must meet the requirements for the Special Award to be eligible for consideration.
- Exhibits that are dirty will not receive a ribbon. Clothing may have been worn if it is laundered or cleaned before being exhibited.
- 13. Laundered exhibits must not carry a fragrance; use only fragrance-free detergent & no dryer sheets. We reserve the right to refuse an entry if the scent is too strong. This is a health issue for volunteers.
- Judging of exhibits will take place Thursday, August 8th before the Fair.
- 15. Any foods that have been on open display must be discarded by the Superintendent for food safety reasons. They cannot be returned to the exhibitor. Canned goods will be returned
- 16. \$1.00 will be awarded for the exhibit judged best in division in the adult departments and \$2.00 in the youth department. There will be no Home Arts Person of the Year awarded in the youth department.
- 17. Exhibitors may not submit any AI-assisted works, wholly or partly. Any entry deemed by Superintendent or judge to be a product of AI will be disqualified and associated entry fee(s) will be forfeited.

SPECIAL AWARDS WILL BE OFFERED

We thank our sponsors for their donation of prizes to be given in the Home Arts Department.

Home Arts Person of the Year (HAP)

A Superintendent's Award of \$50 will be given to the person who enters 8 items as follows: choose enter one entry into 7 of the 8 following departments: A01, A02, A03, A07, A08, A09, and A10 **plus** one entry from either department A04, A05, **or** A06 for a grand total of 8 HAP entries. Only one item per department may be entered as a "HAP" even if you enter more than 1 item per department. Please enter articles as you usually would **AND** type "HAP" in the Description field in the online registration system **AND** note on the exhibit tag in bold print "HAP" (indicating the article is to be considered for the Home Arts Person of the Year). Also inform check-in person. Points will be awarded based on each marked entry's total premiums awarded, with 5 points additional for Best of Division on marked items. The person with the most points wins; in the event of a tie, a drawing will be.

Best of Department – Grand Champion & Champion

The top two (2) entries of each department will be awarded a prize and rosette ribbon.

2025 Fair Theme

Articles representing the 2025 Fair Theme "Saddle Up for the SWW Fair" will be eligible for a special ribbon. Enter articles as you usually would <u>AND</u> type "FT" in the Description field in the online registration system <u>AND</u> note on the exhibit tag in bold print "FT" indicating the article is to be considered for Fair Theme Ribbon <u>AND</u> inform the check-in person.

People's Choice

A "People's Choice" ribbon will be awarded daily to the quilt voted best entry. The visiting public will vote. No premiums are paid.

- Hobbies and crafts that have been shown before cannot be exhibited in succeeding years unless exhibit is entirely new. <u>No</u> <u>display can be exhibited a second year.</u>
- 7. Entries will only be accepted on Friday before the Fair from 11 AM to 1 PM and Saturday before Fair, from 10 AM to 2 PM (space is limited, therefore, department will close when full) at the Hobbies & Crafts Barn. Space for exhibits needing more than one shelf or a large area are to be prearranged with the Superintendent prior to fair.
- 8. Release of exhibits will be 7:30 9 PM Sunday (closing night of Fair) and 10 AM 1:00 PM Monday after Fair.
- Collections must be set up by exhibitor; the presentation is part of the judging. Exhibitors are encouraged to bring fabric, velon, boxes and cans to enhance their display. Educational or

- information on the collection that would assist in making a better display is encouraged. Collections mounted on cardboard for hanging should be covered with cellophane for protection.

The exhibitor should strive to make the width and height fit the subject for the best composition. Photos received which do not meet the size specifications listed WILL BE DISQUALIFIED. Photos must be mounted securely as they are displayed in an unheated building and are subject to humid and damp conditions. Please do not use double stick tape to mount photos. Crafter's multi-purpose spray adhesive works well. A second matte surrounding the print is acceptable. No entries mounted on wood, covered with glass, plastic or framed will be accepted. Exhibitor's, please apply hook side 1-inch Velcro on the back side four corners.
- Digital images may be submitted on a disk or emailed to <u>swwfphoto@gmail.com</u>. A SWWF online registration is required for digital images at the location and time as stated above. Disks

- will not be returned. Files must be in a .jpg format (jpeg). The .jpg compressed image file size is to be a maximum of 1 MB (megabyte). The maximum image pixel size is 1200 pixels in the horizontal and 800 pixels in the vertical dimension. Images received which do not meet the size specifications listed WILL BE DISQUALIFIED.
- 7. Mark each matte board (on back) or CD with the name and phone number of the entrant. If there is any doubt, mark what side is up. No names may be on the front of the mounting or photo for purposes of judging and presentation. Descriptions or titles may be used.
- 8. Special effects (or altered) photos are those that are obviously altered from their original form or show special effects created in the camera or in photo editing. Some examples includes colorizing, toning, collage, photo composites, HDR, light painting, long time exposures, trick photography, and more.
- 9. Photo Editing is an opportunity for photographers to show the editing and photo creation process. Show a beginning and final image and explain or show what was done to arrive at the final image. The photographer may also include information about special camera settings, lighting, timing, location or other special conditions that added to the final image. The entire single display shall meet the photo size requirements listed above.
- 10. All possible care will be taken, but no responsibility will be accepted by the Southwest Washington Fair for loss or damage to entries, in storage or at exhibition.
- 11. Unless otherwise specified, permission to reproduce is assumed. (One time only)
- 12. Entries will be accepted in the Photography Department, located in the Photography Barn, at the Southwest Washington Fairgrounds on Friday, August 8 from 5:00 PM to 6:30 PM and Saturday, August 9 from 12:00 PM to 4:00 PM.
- Right to Refuse All photos must be suitable for viewing by all age groups. Should questions arise concerning eligibility of any entry; the Fair Management's decision will be considered as final.
- 14. Exhibitors may not submit any AI-assisted works, wholly or partly. Any entry deemed by Superintendent or judge to be a product of AI will be disqualified and associated entry fee(s) will be forfeited
- 15. ALL ENTRIES SHOULD BE PICKED UP AT THE PHOTOGRAPHY DEPARTMENT, SUNDAY EVENING, AUGUST 17 FROM 7:00 PM TO 8:30 PM OR MONDAY, AUGUST 18 FROM 3:00 PM 5:00 PM.
- 16. Fair Theme will receive a Fair Theme ribbon.
- 17. Additional awards include: two Judge's Choices, one Superintendent, and one Grand People's Choice. The People's Choice will be selected from the fair week votes tallied and placed Sunday morning of fair week at 10 AM.

- Online entries and entry fees must be submitted by July 2. Late entries will be accepted as space allows. Entry fee is \$6.00 per animal and must accompany online registration system or entry will not be completed. Entry fees are not refundable.
 Substitutions are permitted in same breeds, same class only. All exhibits must be entered using the Southwest Washington Fair online registration system (see above for link). If any entry cannot be made via the online registration system, contact the department superintendent or the Southwest Washington Fair office for assistance. Bring a copy of your confirmation e-mail(s) on entry day.
- 2. Entries are accepted on a first-come, first-served basis, according to date of online registration.
- 3. Entries will be accepted until space is full. In-county entries will be given preference.
- 4. Any exhibitor (whose entries have been accepted) failing to notify the Superintendent or Fair Office they have decided not to exhibit at all, will have their exhibiting privileges suspended for the following year's fair. Entry fees will not be returned.
- Animals must be in place and checked in by 8 PM Monday, before the fair and will remain until released Thursday evening. Pens will be available Monday before the Fair.
- 6. The Fair's minimum health requirements are the same as the recommended minimum health requirements by the State Veterinarian. The Fair Veterinarian will be on the grounds on Monday before Fair. It will be the veterinarian's duty to refuse entry to any animal showing signs of communicable disease, including but not limited to the following: pink—eye, ringworm, open abscesses, sore—mouth (in any stage), lice, foot—rot, etc. The Fair Veterinarian will have the final say on the animal's health, ability to be shown, and fairgrounds livestock health requirements.
- Sawdust will be furnished by the Fair. The exhibitor is expected to clean pens daily and see that pens are kept in a neat and odorfree state at all times.
- 8. An exhibitor shall be defined as any individual, farm, or family group that shall exhibit their animals jointly. Each exhibitor shall have a different exhibitor number and there shall be no sharing of animals by different exhibitors in group classes.
- No exhibitor may receive more than two premiums in any one class. Only two entries per group class, per exhibitor, per breed will be permitted.
- 10. 4-H & FFA may exhibit in open class if space is available and if their animals are housed in the designated 4-H & FFA areas. The exhibitor is expected to comply with all other Open Class requirements.
- 11. Pen space is assigned based on the number of animals entered. Non-entered animals will not be allowed in the barn. All tack must be stored in the space designated by the Superintendent. No dogs allowed in barns.
- 12. All animals must be registered in the Scrapie Program and have a Scrapie Certificate upon arrival.



PURPOSE

The purpose of the Floral Dept. is to promote interest in floriculture through education & demonstration by way of the many beautiful examples of flora & fauna that can be grown here in the PNW. To encourage participation in our local Fair.

GENERAL RULES

- All online exhibits should be entered before midnight on Sunday, August 10 using the Southwest Washington Fair online registration system (see above for link). If possible, bring a printed copy of your confirmation email. If unable to enter online, we will enter for you on Entry Day.
- 2. CUTTING AND CONDITIONING All cut flowers need care after cutting to improve their staying quality. Specimens should be cut in the early morning or evening at a long slant and placed in a container of tepid water immediately. Store in a cool, dark place free of drafts. The flowers should stand in deep water for several hours or overnight. Protect from sunlight and transport specimens in a container of water. Stems should be recut just before entry.
- FOLIAGE -- Cut Flowers are generally shown with foliage attached to the stem. NO accessory foliage is permitted. NO foliage below the water line in final exhibit.
- OWNERSHIP All exhibits must be grown by the exhibitor except for Floral Arrangement (Dept. 5) and Picture Boxes (Dept. 7). Potted plants must have been in the owner's possession for three (3) months.
- GROOMING Wipe off any traces of spray, dust, or insect damage. NO oiling spray or artificial coloring is permitted. Container grown plants should be well watered and groomed.
- LABELING Name your specimen (correct identification is essential.) This is highly educational to the viewing public and a credit to judging. Assistance will be available to help exhibitors identify their entries.
- FLORAL ARRANGEMENT/BOUQET Specimens used in floral arrangements need not be grown by exhibitor, while

- specimens used in bouquets must be grown by exhibitor. Open to all amateurs and professionals. No dyed or artificial plant materials. Must be in exhibitors own container. Clearly mark name and phone number on bottom of container.
- 8. **VASES** will be furnished for all cut specimens, except Floral Bouquets. Exhibitors must provide own container for unusually large or top heavy exhibits, such as Giant Sunflower.
- REMOVAL Exhibits need to be removed Sunday, August 17 from 7 PM to 9 PM and Monday August 18 from 9 AM Noon.
 Early removal, due to unforeseen circumstances must be approved by department Superintendent and will be considered on a case-by-case basis.
- WSDA PROHIBITED Plants and WA State Noxious Weeds will not be permitted. Plant lists can be obtained from the Lewis County Noxious Weed Control Board.
- 11. **MULTIPLE ENTRIES** In the same class must be different color or variety. Entries in "any other variety" must name variety.

GLOSSARY

BLOOM	An individual flower, usually between ½ and ¾ open.
BOUQUET	A group of cut flowers.
BRANCH	A part of a tree that grows out from the trunk.
BUD	An undeveloped flower (or leaf).
GROOMING	Wipe off any traces of spray, dust, or insect damage; remove all old flower petals and dead leaves.
SPIKE	A lengthened flower cluster in which flowers are practically stemless. Examples: gladiolus, snapdragon.
SPRAY	A group of florets on a branched stem, each on its own stalk. Examples: marigolds, petunias, phlox.
STEM	The major supporting structure in plants to which buds, leaves, and flowers are attached at regular intervals at points called nodes.

JUDGING FACTORS

Danish style of judging is used. Ribbons will be awarded to each exhibit based on its merit. Type, quality, and uniformity are basic conditions that are used in judging. Type refers to specimens that are regular and typical of the variety. Quality includes primness for intended use: size, tenderness, cleanliness and freedom from blemishes, damage or defects. Uniformity relates to each specimen having the same shape, size and color as the others in the exhibit.



 AM Tuesday, the first day of the Fair. Substitution cards must be completed.
- 8. Cattle entered in this department must be accompanied by registration papers which will be checked to the animals Tuesday beginning at 10 AM. Transfer evidence of animals recently acquired and absolute proof of purchase must be presented at registration paper check. All animals in barn must be exhibited and shown.
- 9. All 4-H and FFA exhibitors entering open class competition must present registration papers to the dairy department superintendent Tuesday at 3 PM in the dairy barn. Failure to abide by this rule will disqualify exhibitor and entry fees will be forfeited.
- In any class, the judge may in his discretion, award placings of such grade as the exhibit deserves.
- 11. All animals shown in group classes must have been shown in individual open classes.

- 12. All entries, whether owned by one person or more than one person (individually or jointly), which are maintained on one farm, are considered as a single exhibitor in both individual and group classes.
- 13. The Fair Veterinarian will be on grounds at unloading area and livestock barns on Monday, the day before Fair, from 8 AM until 8 PM. It is his/her duty to refuse admission to any animal showing evidence of communicable disease, including warts, ringworm, pneumonia, etc. The Fair's minimum health requirements are the same as the recommended minimum health requirements by the State Veterinarian. The Fair Veterinarian will have the final say on the animal's health, ability to be showed and fairgrounds livestock health requirements. BRUCELLOSIS All female animals must be blood tested (certificate in hand) or calfhood vaccinated.
- 14. Rigid compliance with Fair Veterinarian decisions will be compulsory through the run of the Fair.
 - a. Animals will not be accepted in any livestock departments after 8 PM on the Monday before Fair opens.
 - b. Animal health treatment required while at the fairgrounds shall be the sole obligation of the exhibitor. Any veterinarian of exhibitor's choice may be called.
 - c. Any animal showing evidence of communicable disease after having been admitted to the barns shall be removed at any time at the request of the Fair Veterinarian.
- 14. It shall be understood by the exhibitor that if at any time during the course of the Fair his/her animal seriously detracts from the overall esthetic value of the department, the Fair management shall request the Fair Veterinarian to dismiss the animal.
- 15. Any exhibitor requesting the removal of an animal at any time during the Fair for health reasons must have the animal examined by the Fair Veterinarian and abide by his/her decision. Failure to do so will result in forfeiture of premiums and exhibiting privileges in the future.
- 17. Judging will be done Wednesday during the Fair at 10 AM sharp with alternating classes. If an animal is not ready to enter the ring when it is called, the exhibitor will automatically forfeit his/her entry fee paid and will be scratched from the judge's sheet for that competition.
- 18. Lunch break will be when the judge deems appropriate.
- A herdsman will be allowed to enter a breeder's animal in the name of the herdsman. Breeder's name must also be shown on the entry form.
- 20. All departments must be in show shape by 9 AM.
- 21. Animals in 4–H and FFA Departments will be eligible to exhibit the same animal or animals in the same or similar classes or classes in the open class dairy department. All 4–H AND FFA MEMBERS exhibiting in open class dairy department must conform in a strict sense to those rules and regulations applicable to the Open Class Dairy Cattle department. This includes the payment of entry fees and entry deadline. All animals crossentered to the open class department must be stalled in the 4–H and FFA livestock buildings and adhere to the rules and regulations set forth by FFA and 4–H dairy departments.
- 22. Anyone not in compliance with the above may be refused entry the following year.
- 23. Premier breeder & exhibitor will be judged on the top six animals.
- 24. There must be three or more entries in a class to qualify for premiums according to the premium point chart below. If there are less than three entries in a class, 1st place will receive no more than \$25 and 2nd place (if any) will receive no more than \$15.
- 25. No exhibitor may receive more than two payments in any one class.
- Exhibitors may not bed down or setup any type of sleeping apparatus in the exhibit area.
- 27. Parking regulations will be strictly enforced. Vehicles are restricted to a parking lot by 9:45 AM unless prior arrangements have been made with Fair Management.
- 28. A tent, no larger than 10'x10'x5' high, for exhibitor's personal use or tack storage is acceptable within exhibitor's stall space.

- Animals are not to be released early except by a vet's recommendation.
- 30. NOTE: The new stall system is an investment in the future of this Fair and hope that you appreciate the stalls. Please do not drill or drive nails into the stall system. If an Exhibitor fails to comply, the Exhibitor will be held financially responsible for necessary repairs, including forfeiture of premiums.



SHEEP DEPARTMENT OBJECTIVES

To show the public the variety of breeds of sheep, to encourage the people from the surrounding area to show at the local Fair, and provide a presentation of the by–products from the many breeds of sheep. Education of the public is strongly recommended.

GENERAL RULES

- All entries must be completed no later than July 18 using the Southwest Washington Fair online registration system (see above for link). If any entry cannot be made via the online registration system, contact the department superintendent or the Southwest Washington Fair office for assistance. Bring a copy of your confirmation e-mail(s) on entry day. Sheep are shown on Saturday during the Fair, starting at 10 AM.
- 2. Judging will be done in order as posted on show day.
- All breeding animals must be properly registered in the association they represent and must bear the flock tag of the association. Animals not bearing identification appropriate to their association may not be exhibited.
- 4. Exhibitors will be limited to two entries in singles and one entry in group classes. Animals in group classes must have been shown in individual classes. It is not necessary for entries in group classes to identify animals to be shown.

- 5. An entry fee of \$6.00 **PER HEAD** will be collected as part of the online registration process. In the event of a cancellation of entries, the fee is **NOT REFUNDABLE**.
- 6. Sheep shown in the open class section must be in show condition.
- Sheep will be shown by class. Entries cannot be changed after the paper check on Friday.
- All flocks exhibited in the open class show must be identified by a sign or other appropriate means throughout the duration of the Fair indicating youth or adult open class.
- All animals must remain in place until official release time. No truck or trailers are to be in the sheep area prior to official release time. Violation of these regulations may result in forfeiture of premium money.
- 10. While the total process of removing sheep from the exhibit area is generally confined to a two-hour period, exhibitors are asked to extend the courtesy of loading first to those who must travel the greatest distance.
- 11. A display area for sheep pictures and literature will be provided. Exhibitors wishing to publicize their particular breed are encouraged to bring literature with them for display and/or distribution purposes.
- 12. Under divisions 17 and 18, other registered breeds: each breed will be judged separately for ribbons only. The blue ribbon winner of each breed will then be judged in one class to determine the animal that represents their breed the best. These animals will receive premiums, and the first place ram and ewe will compete for best of show.
- 13. Sheep showing in Division 8, Natural Colored, must be registered in the Natural Colored Wool Growers Association (NCWGA).
- 14. Due to space issues, stall assignment will be based on 2 sheep per stall.

ANIMAL HEALTH

- 1. The Fair Veterinarian will be on the grounds Friday morning at 7AM to check all animals. Exhibitors must be in attendance at that time. It is the duty of the veterinarian to refuse admission to any animal showing evidence of any communicable disease. The Fair's minimum health requirements are the same as the recommended minimum health requirements by the State Veterinarian. The Fair Veterinarian will have the final say on the animal's health, ability to be shown, and fairgrounds livestock health requirements.
- Animal health treatment required while at the fairgrounds shall be the sole obligation of the exhibitor. Any veterinarian of the exhibitor's choice may be called.
- Any animal showing signs of a communicable disease after having been admitted to the barns shall be removed at any time at the request of the Fair Veterinarian.
- 4. It shall be understood by the exhibitor that if at any time during the course of the Fair his/her animal seriously detracts from the overall aesthetic value of the department, the officers of the Fair will dismiss the animal.
- 5. An exhibitor requesting the removal of an animal at any time during the Fair for health reasons must have the animal examined by the Fair Veterinarian. You must abide by his/her decision. Failure to do so will result in forfeiture of premiums and exhibiting privileges in the future.

<u>Notice</u>: Scrapie identification tags are required for all sheep regardless of breed or state of origin.



- 8. Incoming animals will be screened visually for communicable diseases warts, ringworm, etc. The Fair Veterinarian will inspect the cattle on Friday morning and any animal not passing this inspection and any subsequent inspections will be excused. Any exhibitor requesting the removal of an animal at any time during the Fair for health reasons must have the animal examined by the Fair Veterinarian and abide by his/her decision. Veterinarian services requested by an exhibitor during the Fair shall be the exhibitor's responsibility.
- All animals must be double tied and all bulls 9 months and older must have a nose ring when being moved and shown.
- 10. Adequate space will be allocated each exhibitor for animals, tack, clipping chutes, and feed. All clipping chutes will be kept out of the aisles except on show day. Bedding (sawdust or shavings) will be furnished by the Fair with all feed the responsibility of the exhibitor. Due to power restrictions, if you have a generator, you may want to bring it.
- 11. All exhibitors shall have their area in show shape by 9 AM each day of the Fair. It shall also be understood that if at any time during the Fair an exhibitor's animal seriously detracts from the overall aesthetic value of the Fair, Fair officials may dismiss such exhibits.

- 3. All birds should be provided with leg bands and the band numbers should be listed as part of the online registration using the Tag ID field. (Leg bands can be applied at show and band number written on coop card. Bands are not mandatory, but recommended.) All varieties of pigeons competing in the young bird classes must wear 2025 seamless band of correct size. NO slip bands on racing homers.
- 4. For the purpose of this exhibition the terms "cock", "hen", and "old trio" shall mean birds over one year of age, the terms "cockerel", "pullet", and "young trio", shall mean birds less than one year of age.
- 5. All entries must be at least 4 months old.
- 6. Entry fees shall be \$1.00 for single entries and \$2.00 for trio entries. Fees are collected via the online registration system. Entry fees shall be forfeited on entries not shown.
- 7. The Superintendent shall have the right to refuse entry to the show room or to remove from the same, all diseased or unsightly birds. The Fair's minimum health requirements are the same as the recommended minimum health requirements by the State Veterinarian.
- 8. No one will be allowed to pick up eggs laid during the show except Fair employees. Absolutely no handling of birds will be allowed without permission of the owner or the Superintendent. Only those appointed by Superintendent as handlers will be allowed in Showroom during judging.
- All exhibits must be in place at 9 AM Tuesday during Fair for judging.
- 10. All exhibits must be removed Sunday of Fair. Any exhibits left after 9:30 PM shall be done so at the exhibitor's risk unless specifically arranged with the Superintendent.
- The Fair will not be responsible for loss, theft, or damage of any exhibit, although every precaution will be taken to insure against such hazards.
- The Fair has no facilities to handle shipments of birds and cannot accept any such shipments.
- 13. There will be no charge for feed or care of the birds while at the Fair. All exhibits will be cared for by the Superintendent.
- 14. Due to space limitations, the Superintendent reserves the right to limit entries if necessary.
- Due to limited space, the Poultry Department will only accept entries of quality ducks. Only recognized breeds and varieties will be accepted.

The Fair's minimum health requirements are the same as the state veterinarian. The Fair Veterinarian will be on the grounds Friday morning. It will be the veterinarian's duty to refuse entry to any animal showing signs of communicable disease, including, but not limited to the following: pink-eye, ringworm, open abscesses, sore mouth (in any stage), lice, hoof rot, etc. The Fair veterinarian will have the final say on the animal's health, ability to be shown, adhering to the fairground's livestock health requirements. All animals must be registered in the Scrapie Program and have a Scrapie Certificate upon arrival. Contact the USDA Olympia office at 360-753-9430 for information on the Scrapie Program.

All pens are to be cleaned daily and kept in a neat and odor-free condition at all times.

An exhibitor shall be defined as any individual, farm, or family group who exhibit their animals jointly. Each exhibitor shall have a different exhibitor number and there shall be no sharing of animals by different exhibitors in group classes.

Participation in all HASC Youth Challenges will be based on the following criteria:

- 1. Applicant is a youth between 9 to 19 years of age as of January 1, 2025.
- 2. First create a profile and indicate the classes in which you intend to compete at

3. Then complete the Google Entry Form by August 5 to qualify as a pre-entry or by August 1 for Non-Southwest Washington Fair youth. One Google Entry Form must be submitted for each rider/horse combination. Complete the Google Form at https://forms.gle/FjMES2j6DtqjV86W9.

More than one Google Form entry may be submitted. Youth may qualify with more than one horse throughout the year but can only compete on one rider/horse combination. An entry form may be submitted for each show they have attended. Any incomplete entry form will be rejected.

- 3. The individual class prerequisite has been met. Prerequisites include the class must be a canter/lope class as well as the rider and horse combination must have placed 1st through 5th in the class type (minimum of 6 horses). The placement must be in the top half of the class (*i.e.*, 4th place out of 8 horses qualifies; 4th place out of 4 horses does not qualify). This must be a placing in an individual class, not an overall event or high-point placing. If there is a question if the placing qualifies, submit the entry form and HASC will make a determination. The placement must have been on or after January 1, 2025. Class types are: English Equitation, Stock Seat/Western Equitation, Trail, or Western Games
- 4. Space is available. Challenge class sizes will be a total of 15 for Showmanship, English Equitation, Stock Seat/Western Equitation, Trail and 20 for Western Games. Southwest Washington Fair youth will be considered for participation in 12 spots for gaming. Five (5) of the Southwest Washington Fair youth slots will be drawn from pre-entries submitted by August 5, 2025. The remaining of the pre-entries will go into a general pool to fill the remaining slots with

all the other entries submitted until the day of the challenge. Three (3) slots for Showmanship, English Equitation, Stock Seat/Western Equitation, Trail, and Western Games are guaranteed to Non-Southwest Washington Fair youth. If there are more than three qualified entries, participation will be decided by random draw conducted by HASC on August 4, 2025.

5. Parent or guardian has accepted the Southwest Washington Fairgrounds release on the Google Form entry.

Fair management reserves the right to ask any applicant to verify their prerequisite for any challenge. Fair management also reserves the right to exclude any applicant for safety concerns.

For non-Southwest Washington Fair participants, haul in and vet check is between 5:00 to 6:00 PM or between 10:00 to 11:00 AM depending on start time on the day of the challenge.

For those applicants attending the Southwest Washington Fair, a list of the potential challenge applicant pool for the day will be posted at the HASC office. - If an entry is accepted without pre-registration, you must pay the entry fee of \$25.00 per animal at that time. The superintendent can accept cash payments. Alternatively, the Fair Office can accept credit/debit card payments.
- 3. The Fair Veterinarian will be on grounds and in unloading area and livestock barns on Monday before Fair from 8 AM until 11 AM. It is the veterinarian's duty to refuse admission to any animal showing evidence of communicable disease. The Fair's minimum health requirements are the same as the recommended minimum health requirements by the State Veterinarian. The Fair

- Veterinarian will have the final say on the animal's health, ability to be showed and fairgrounds livestock health requirements.
- 4. Due to space limitations, the Superintendent reserves the right to limit entries if necessary.
- 5. Due to limited space, the Open Class Swine shows are currently only open to those exhibits already participating in 4H/FFA and already housed in the Swine Barn.
